THE GAME: The Boise State football team, now ranked 13th in both the Associated Press and Amway Coaches Polls, travels to Laramie, Wyo., this week to square off against Wyoming in a match-up of Mountain West teams tied atop the Mountain Division standings. The Broncos (7-0, 3-0 MW) and Cowboys (5-2, 3-0 MW) are slated to kick at 5 p.m. at War Memorial Stadium, and the game will be nationally televised by CBS Sports Network.

THE SERIES: The Broncos are a perfect 10-0 against the Cowboys in a series that dates back to 2002, including five-straight victories as conference rivals in the Mountain West. The Broncos' five wins at War Memorial Stadium have been by an average of 30.8 points.



The 2016 Boise State football campaign marks the 30th anniversary of the world-famous Blue Turf at Albertsons Stadium.

Boise State installed the first non-green field for the 1986 season, and since that time is a combined 169-36 on The Blue, a winning percentage of .824.

Since 2000, Boise State has gone 100-6 at home (.943), the nation's best home winning percentage during that time.

ONE OF THE LAST UNBEATENS: Boise State, at 7-0, is one of only nine schools in the country that has yet to lose a game in 2016, a list that also includes Alabama (8-0), Baylor (6-0), Clemson (7-0), Michigan (7-0), Nebraska (7-0), Washington (7-0), West Virginia (6-0) and Western Michigan (7-0).

A CHANCE TO CONTROL THE MOUNTAIN: Saturday’s meeting between a pair of 3-0 (Mountain West) teams in Boise State and Wyoming is crucial to the Broncos’ pursuit of the Mountain Division crown. While the teams are tied atop the division, a Bronco win would give Boise State what would amount to a two-game lead over the Cowboys, as well as one-loss New Mexico, with four to play as the Broncos would hold the head-to-head tiebreakers over each team. Boise State also holds the head-to-head tiebreakers with Mountain Division foes Colorado State (2-2) and Utah State (1-3), and is three games ahead of Air Force (1-3).

EXORCISING DEMONS: Boise State lost four games last season, and all four teams are back on the schedule for 2016. The Road to Redemption began Oct. 1 against Utah State, and continued against New Mexico (Oct. 7) and BYU (Oct. 20). The Broncos have avenged the first three losses, knocking off the Aggies (21-10), downing the Lobos (49-21) and defeating the Cougars (28-27), and have one more chance for retribution - against Air Force in the regular-season finale, Nov. 25.

Stringing together back-to-back wins is rare for Boise State’s opponents. Since the Broncos joined the Western Athletic Conference in 2001, only two opponents have notched back-to-back victories over Boise State - San Diego State (2012-13) and Air Force (2014-15). Only 10 conference opponents in school history have accomplished the feat against Boise State.

15 YEARS IN THE RANKINGS:

When Boise State cracked the polls entering week five of the 2016 season, it marked the 15th-consecutive season (2002-16; AP) that Boise State had been ranked for at least one week. The streak is tied with USC for the eighth-longest in the country. The nation's 10-longest streaks can be found on page 18.

MOVIN' ON UP: The Broncos' ranking of No. 13 in both the Associated Press and Coaches Polls this week is the highest since concluding 2011 ranked eighth and sixth, respectively.

IT'S COOL, GUYS: Boise State did not open the 2016 season ranked in either the AP or Coaches Polls. However, historically, that seems to bode well for the Broncos. Over the course of the previous 14 seasons, Boise State did not open the season ranked in the preseason polls on six occasions. Each year - 2002, 2003, 2004, 2006, 2008 and 2014 - the Broncos finished ranked in the top 25. In two of those seasons (2006 and 2014), the Broncos capped their season with wins in the Fiesta Bowl.

SUCCESS WHEN RANKED: Boise State has an all-time record of 98-13 (.883) when ranked in the top 25 of the AP and/or Coaches Polls.

MOUNT RUSHMORE

BIG PLAYS AGAINST THE COWBOYS

The following is the Mount Rushmore of big plays against Wyoming for Boise State:

Donte Deayon's 75-yard Punt Return TD Nov. 22, 2014

Boise State, already up 49-7 in Laramie, forced the Cowboys into a three-and-out with just under seven minutes left in the third quarter. Ethan Wood punted 44 yards where Donte Deayon fielded it at the Bronco 25. Deayon, from the left hash mark, eluded four Wyoming pursuers before finding open space, and made one final juke to shed a defender at the 35 before finishing off the return. Boise State went on to win the game, 63-14.

Jay Ajayi Scores On Statue Left Nov. 22, 2014

Leading 21-7 and aiming to put a stranglehold on the game, Boise State had a 1st-and-10 at the Wyoming 20 and dialed up a play from its past. Quarterback Grant Hedrick faked a throw to the right while Jay Ajayi took the handoff from behind Hedrick's back and went nearly untouched for the touchdown. It was Ajayi's second touchdown of the contest, and he went on to finish the 63-14 Bronco win with 110 rushing yards and two scores on 16 carries, and two catches for 92 yards and another score.

Quinton Jones' 61-Yard Pick-Six Sept. 16, 2006

Looking to improve to 3-0 in what would go on to be a historic season, Boise State led Wyoming 10-3 midway through the second quarter when defensive back Quinton Jones made the big play, picking off Jacob Doss and taking it 61 yards for the touchdown. The score put the Broncos up, 17-3, and the Jones and the Bronco defense would hold firm in the second half to preserve Boise State's 17-10 win in Laramie.

Darian Thompson With The Pick-Six Nov. 22, 2014

Boise State was already well in control of the contest, leading Wyoming 42-7 in the third quarter, when safety Darian Thompson got in on the highlight-reel act. The Bronco All-America safety picked off a Tom Thornton third-down pass at the Cowboy 36 and followed his blockers all the way to paydirt, putting the Broncos ahead 49-7. The interception was Thompson's sixth of the season, and he would go on to finish the year with seven.

GAME NOTES

THE HARSIN ERA: The Broncos are in their third year under head coach Bryan Harsin, a former Bronco quarterback and assistant coach. Harsin led the Broncos to a record of 12-2 in his debut season, which included the school's first outright Mountain West Championship since joining the league in 2011 and the school's third victory in the Fiesta Bowl. For his efforts in year one, Harsin was named a finalist for the Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award, the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award and the Dodd Trophy, given annually by the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Foundation. In year two, the Broncos went 9-4 and defeated Northern Illinois 55-7 in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl. And for the second-straight season, Harsin was named a midseason finalist for the Dodd Trophy, the only one from a non-Resource Five school.

COACHING CHANGES: The Broncos have a different offensive coordinator for the fourth time in as many seasons, but this time around, multiple people will handle the responsibilities. Offensive line coach Scott Huff and quarterbacks coach Zak Hill will serve as co-offensive coordinators, and head coach Bryan Harsin will call the plays. The Broncos also have a new defensive coordinator, as linebackers coach Andy Avalos takes over the defense in 2016. Hill is entering his first season with the Broncos, as are defensive backs/cornerbacks coach Ashley Ambrose and safeties coach Gabe Franklin. Hill spent the last seven seasons at Eastern Washington, where he helped lead the Eagles to the 2010 FCS National Championship. Ambrose, a former All-Pro cornerback in the NFL, was at Texas State in 2015. Franklin, a three-time all-league honoree for Boise State, spent the last five seasons at UTEP.

FEELS LIKE 2011: Boise State's 7-0 start to 2016 matches the program's best through the first seven games since 2011, when the Broncos finished 12-1. From 2006-11, the Broncos opened five of those six seasons (2007 being the exception) 7-0, and here's how Boise State finished each of those seasons:

- 2006 - 13-0 (Fiesta Bowl champions)
- 2008 - 12-1 (lost at Poinsettia Bowl)
- 2009 - 14-0 (Fiesta Bowl champions)
- 2010 - 12-1 (MAACO Bowl Las Vegas champions)
- 2011 - 12-1 (MAACO Bowl Las Vegas champions)

ALL GOOD THINGS...: This year's Boise State team set the program's FBS-era (1996-present) record for longest season-opening stretch without trailing, passing the 2009 team's previous mark of 306:35 in Oct. 15's game against Colorado State. However, Colorado State's game-opening field goal with 7:24 left in the opening quarter ended Boise State's status as the last FBS team to have not trailed in 2016, and ended the season-opening run at 307:36.

It was just the second time in school history that the Broncos had not trailed at any point through the season's first five games, and like the 2009 team, it was the sixth game of the season in which the run was snapped. The 2009 team's run was broken when Tulsa scored 6:35 into the sixth game of the season to go up 7-0. As noted above, Boise State had been the last FBS team in 2016 to trail in a contest. The Broncos had been tied twice during that span (7-7 against both Oregon State and Utah State).

CONFERENCE RECORD: Since 2000, Boise State is a national-best 114-13 (.897) in conference play. Since joining the FBS in 1996, the Broncos have played in three leagues: the Big West (1996-2000), WAC (2001-10) and Mountain West (2011-Present). Over the campaigns in those three conferences, the Broncos have posted an all-time record of 124-23 (.844). Boise State went 5-3 in Mountain West play in 2015, just the second time since 1998 - when Boise State went 2-3 in the Big West - that the Broncos lost three conference contests in a season. It was also just the fourth time since 2001 - Boise State's first year in the WAC - that the Broncos lost multiple conference games (also went 6-2 in WAC play in 2001).

GAME NOTES

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS: Boise State will be looking for its 19th conference title in 2016. The Broncos have played in four leagues all time, and have won multiple conference championships in each: six in the Big Sky (1970-95), two in the Big West (1996-2000), eight in the WAC (2001-10) and two in the MW (2011-Present).

MW SUCCESS: Since joining the Mountain West for the 2011 season, Boise State has lost just eight conference games, with only two of those eight losses being by more than seven points. Prior to a 28-14 loss to Air Force (Sept. 27) in 2014, the Broncos' four league losses were by a combined seven points: TCU in 2011 (36-35); San Diego State in 2012 (21-19); Fresno State (41-40) and SDSU (34-31, OT) in 2013. That 14-point loss at Air Force, along with a 52-26 loss at Utah State last season, are Boise State's only two Mountain West losses of more than seven points. No team in the Mountain West boasts a winning record over Boise State.

AGAINST THE POWER FIVE: Boise State went 2-0 in its matchups with the Power Five in 2016, defeating Washington State (31-28) and Oregon State (38-24) in consecutive games. The wins improve the Broncos to 14-5 against schools from the Power Five since the start of the 2006 season, and up the team's winning streak against such opposition to five. Boise State has also won 15 games against Power Five schools since 2003, third-best among all Group of Five teams over that span (Navy - 22, BYU - 21). It should be noted that all five of Boise State's losses to Power Five schools since 2006 have come on the road or at a neutral site. Since notching its first victory over a Power Five school, a 34-16 win over Iowa State in the 2002 Humanitarian Bowl, Boise State is 16-9 all-time in games against Power Five teams, and 16-21 overall.

PAC-12 SUCCESS: Boise State's 38-24 win at Oregon State (Sept. 24), combined with Sept. 10's 31-28 win over Washington State, improved the Broncos to 2-0 against the Pac-12 this season. While Boise State is 11-13 overall against the Pac-12, the Broncos are 11-5 against the Power Five conference since 2004 and are currently on a four-game winning streak dating back to the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl victory over Arizona.

AMONG THE GREATEST: Boise State is the third-best all-time winning percentage amongst the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Broncos' all-time record at the four-year level entering this Saturday is 425-159-2 (.727). Michigan is first on the all-time list (932-331-36; .7313) with Notre Dame is second (894-317-42; .7302). For the complete top 15, see page four.

ESTABLISHING A LEGACY: The Broncos are the winningest football program in the country since 2000, with an overall record of 183-32 (.851). Ohio State (175-38; .822), Oklahoma (176-43; .804), LSU (164-50; .766) and TCU (157-50; .758) round out the top five. For the complete top 15, see page four.

OUT OF THE NORM: The Broncos went 9-4 in 2015, missing double-digit victories for just the second time in the last decade. Boise State has won 10-or-more games in 13 of the last 17 seasons, including 12-or-more in six of the last 10.

SENIOR SUCCESS: Each of the last 14 Boise State senior classes have won at least 40 games during their careers, or an average of 10 victories per season. The 2016 class will need to win 11 games to make it 15-straight senior classes, having won eight games in 2013, 12 in 2014 and nine last season.

BOWLING AGAIN: Boise State made its 14th-straight bowl appearance and the 16th over the last 17 years in 2015, and with Oct. 15's victory over Colorado State is eligible for a 15th-straight bowl appearance. The current bowl-appearance streak is tied with Wisconsin for the sixth-longest in the country, trailing only Florida State (34), Virginia Tech (23), Georgia (19), Oklahoma (17) and LSU (16). Since the Broncos joined FBS in 1996, they have failed to make the postseason just four times (1996-98, 2001). In 2001, the last season in which the Broncos did not go bowling, Boise State was bowl-eligible with an 8-4 record but was not selected for a game.

GAME NOTES

RETURNING ALL-MW: Of the 13 Broncos named All-MW in 2015, seven return for the 2016 season. Quarterback Brett Rypien was named Mountain West Freshman of the Year in addition to being one of six Broncos named to the first team. He was joined on the first team by wide receiver Thomas Sperbeck and kicker Tyler Rausa. Tight end Jake Roh and running back Jeremy McNichols were each named second team, while linebacker Tanner Vallejo and offensive lineman Mario Yakoo were named honorable mention.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS: The Broncos were one of only five schools in the country to receive the NCAA's Public Recognition Award in football for ranking in the top-10 percent nationally in APR from 2010 through 2014. Joining the Broncos were Clemson, Duke, Northwestern and Rutgers. At the conclusion of the 2015-16 academic year, the Boise State football team posted a combined cumulative grade-point average of 3.12, the highest on record. Additionally, the Broncos boasted a league-high 30 members on the Fall Academic All-Mountain West Team. Boise State has led the MW in all-academic selections in each of its five seasons in the league.

NON-SATURDAY GAMES: Boise State will play five non-Saturday games during the 2016 season, the fourth-straight season with four-or-more such games. Included are three Friday games and a Thursday game. Including the bowl game, the Broncos played seven non-Saturday games last season. Boise State is 50-14 all-time in non-Saturday games after Oct. 7's 49-21 win at New Mexico.

DEFENSE...

THE "MOA CONSTRICTOR" DOES IT ALL: Redshirt sophomore nose tackle David Moa picked up a pair of solo tackles and a sack in Thursday night's 28-27 win over BYU, but where he made his biggest contribution was BYU's attempted game-winning field goal with 15 seconds remaining. Moa burst through the center of the BYU line and got his hand up, blocking Rhett Almond's 44-yard attempt to preserve the Bronco lead. For his efforts on the final drive, Moa was named Mountain West Special Teams Player of the Week, his first-career weekly conference honor.

Moa's sack upped his season total to 6.5, second in the Mountain West and the most by a Bronco interior lineman since Andrew Browning had 8.5 in 2006.

THE "MONEY DOWN": Through seven games Boise State's defense has answered the call when it comes to stops on third down, or, as the Bronco defense calls it, the "money down." Opponents have been successful on only 41-of-123 third-down conversions (33.3 percent), a figure that ranks seventh in the country and leads the Mountain West.

Thursday night, BYU went just 4-for-17 on its third-down plays as the Bronco defense did its job in getting off the field.

BANGIN' AND MASHIN': Redshirt senior defensive tackle Elliot Hoyte put together his best game of the season in Thursday's win over BYU, pacing the defensive line with seven tackles (five solo), 1.5 sacks and 2.5 tackles-for-loss. The big Englishman (Hoyte is from Tavistock, England) recorded his first sacks of the season in the contest, and for the year has made 15 tackles (nine solo) and 4.0 tackles-for-loss.

CLUTCH BLOCKS: David Moa's block of BYU's attempted game-winning field goal against BYU was Boise State's second blocked field goal of the season, following Sam McCaskill's block Sept. 10 against Washington State. Coincidentally, each block has factored heavily into the Broncos' winning margin of each contest, as Moa's block preserved a 28-27 win, and McCaskill's denied Washington State three points in a contest that ended up 31-28 in favor of the Broncos.

CONTROLLING THE SECOND LEVEL: Boise State's starting linebacker trio of Tanner Vallejo, Ben Weaver and Darren Lee has played a pivotal role all season, contributing to Boise State's defensive rankings of 42nd in rushing defense (141.3 ypg), 24th in scoring defense (20.4 ppg) and 40th in total defense (364.0 ypg).

BRONCOS IN THE NFL

There are currently 18 Broncos on National Football League rosters (as of Sept. 4), and 13 teams have at least one former member of the Boise State football team on its roster. At least one Bronco has been selected in the NFL Draft in each of the last seven seasons, and 18 players have been drafted during that time - including seven in the first two rounds. GAME NOTES

The three linebackers are also Boise State's top-three tacklers, as Weaver leads the Broncos with 56 tackles this season, with Vallejo second with 47 and Lee third at 44. The trio has also contributed 11.5 tackles-for-loss and 4.0 sacks.

Also making an impact is this group is newcomer Blake Whitlock, a junior-college transfer from Saddleback College. Whitlock made his first start Oct. 1 against Utah State, and this year has 18 tackles (seven solo) with 1.5 sacks and 3.5 tackles-for-loss.

BREAKOUT SEASON FOR LEE: Redshirt senior linebacker Darren Lee has always been one of the Broncos' most intense performers on the field, making his bones as the team's special-teams ace. This year, however, Lee has stepped into a starter's role at linebacker and has excelled, currently ranking third on the team with 44 tackles (29 solo) while leading the Bronco linebackers' corps in sacks (3.0) and tackles-for-loss (6.5). Lee is also responsible for one of Boise State's two defensive touchdowns in 2016, stripping an Oregon State receiver of the ball and taking it 19 yards for the final points of the Broncos' 38-24 win in Corvallis on Sept. 24.

Prior to this year, Lee had made 49 tackles in his role on special teams and as a backup linebacker from 2013-15.

SAFETIES IN THE ACTION: Starting safeties Cameron Hartsfield and Chancellor James have been two of Boise State's most consistent tacklers and vital to the secondary's success in 2016. Hartsfield ranks fourth on the team with 39 tackles (25 solo), including 2.0 for loss, while James, despite missing Sept. 3's opener at Louisiana, is fifth on the team with 36 tackles (25 solo) and 2.0 tackles-for-loss. Thursday night against BYU, James made seven tackles (three solo) while Hartsfield recorded four tackles (two solo) of his own and broke up a pass.

DROPPING GUYS BEHIND THE LINE: Boise State, despite facing a larger offensive line in BYU, still managed to power its way into the backfield and make 4.0 sacks and 9.0 tackles-for-loss in Thursday's win. Defensive tackle Elliot Hoyte led the way with 1.5 sacks and 2.5 tackles-for-loss, while 11 different players recorded at least a share of a TFL. Boise State's defense now ranks fourth in the country and leads the Mountain West in sacks per game (3.57), with the team total of 21.0 ranking tied for fourth in the FBS.

This effort is paced by the defensive line trio of nose tackle David Moa (6.5 sacks), defensive end Sam McCaskill (5.0 sacks), STUD end Jabril Frazier (4.0 sacks) and Hoyte (1.5 sacks). Moa ranks second, McCaskill fifth and Frazier tied for eighth in the Mountain West in sacks. The Bronco defense has also made 57.0 tackles for loss, led by 10.5 from McCaskill and 7.0 from Moa.

BUT THEY SAID THIS WASN'T LAST YEAR'S D-LINE: Boise State's 2015 defensive line finished that season ranked fifth in the nation in rushing defense, allowing just 108.2 yards per game. After losing every starter from that unit to graduation or the NFL Draft, many had reservations about how well this year's unit would perform. The crew of Sam McCaskill, David Moa, Elliot Hoyte, Jabril Frazier and Gabe Perez have answered the call, helping the Boise State defense rank fourth in the nation with 3.57 sacks per game.

Leading the way has been McCaskill, a redshirt senior who started for the Broncos in 2014, and this year leads the unit with 30 tackles (20 solo) and 10.5 tackles-for-loss, along with 5.0 sacks. Redshirt sophomore David Moa leads the team with 6.5 sacks on the season, while Hoyte (15 tackles, 1.5 sacks, 4.0 tackles-for-loss) and Frazier (25 tackles, 4.0 sacks) have also brought the heat up front.

TWO GAMES, TWO DEFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS: The Boise State defense came up with big, momentum-swinging touchdowns in consecutive games earlier this season. Sept. 10 against Washington State, it was cornerback Tyler Horton with the 85-yard pick-six on the opening drive of the game

to put the Broncos up, 7-0, and on Sept. 24 at Oregon State it was middle linebacker Darren Lee stripping Beaver receiver Seth Collins and taking it 19 yards to the end zone in the fourth quarter. Lee's play helped ice the win for the Broncos, as the Beavers had cut the Boise State lead to 14 (31-17) and was looking to drive for a score to make it a one-possession game.

VALLEJO MAKING PLAYS: Linebacker Tanner Vallejo is enjoying a productive senior season, racking up 47 tackles, second on the team despite missing Oct. 1's contest against Utah State. Vallejo made 14 tackles in Sept. 10's win over Washington State, and followed up with four (two solo) and a shared tackle-for-loss in abbreviated action at Oregon State. Thursday night against BYU he led the team with 11 tackles (five solo) and shared a sack.

For the season, Vallejo has also made 4.0 tackles-for-loss and shared a sack.

SECONDARY STANDING OUT: Boise State's secondary has performed well through the first six games of the season, led by first-time starter Cameron Hartsfield, who ranks fourth on the team with 39 tackles (25 solo). Fellow first-time starter Evan Tyler made four tackles (three solo) before suffering a season-ending knee injury Sept. 24 at Oregon State, while Chancellor James has contributed 36 tackles (25 solo) including 2.0 tackles-for-loss.

Cornerback Tyler Horton has contributed the play of the year so far for the secondary, recording an 85-yard pick-six Sept. 10 against Washington State, and earning Mountain West Defensive Player of the Week recognition for it. Raymond Ford made the unit's second interception of the season Oct. 7 at New Mexico.

NOT AS MANY NEW FACES AS YOU'D THINK: Boise State returns four starters from its 2015 defensive unit which ranked 12th in the FBS in total defense (318.3 yards per game) and fifth in rushing defense (108.2 yards per game). However, there is a stable of individuals returning with starting experience, including redshirt senior defensive lineman Sam McCaskill, redshirt senior defensive tackle Elliot Hoyte, redshirt junior linebacker Joey Martarano, cornerbacks Raymond Ford (redshirt senior) and Tyler Horton (sophomore), and safeties Dylan Sumner-Gardner (redshirt sophomore) and Kameron Miles (redshirt junior).

OFFENSE...

McNICHOLS LEADS THE COUNTRY: Junior running back Jeremy McNichols scored a touchdown on the ground and through the air in Thursday's 28-27 win over BYU, bringing his season touchdown total to 16, tied for the national lead with Louisville's Lamar Jackson. For McNichols, a three-time Mountain West Player of the Week in 2016, Thursday's game was the 10th of his career in which he recorded both a rushing and receiving touchdown. Combined with last year's scoring output (26 touchdowns), McNichols' total of 42 touchdowns since the start of the 2015 season is the most of any FBS player.

He's continued to bull his way into the Doak Walker Award (nation's best RB) conversation, with Thursday's 140 rushing yards on 30 carries following up a performance five days earlier against Colorado State in which McNichols set career bests in carries (40), rushing yards (217) and all-purpose yards (264) in Boise State's 28-23 win. McNichols' 40 carries against the Rams set a Boise State single-game record, eclipsing Cedric Minter's 38-year-old record of 38, and his 217 yards on the ground made for his second 200-yard performance of not only his career but also this season, having previously gone for 208 yards at Oregon State (Sept. 24).

McNichols has also been a major threat out wide, catching 25 passes for 372 yards and four touchdowns this season, a year after hauling in 51 passes for 460 yards and six scores in 2015. Thursday night against BYU, McNichols caught five passes for 109 yards including one catch that went

for 76 yards and the game's opening score. Paired with his 140 rushing yards, McNichols' 100-100 game was just the fifth in Boise State history.

McNichols has also worked his way into good company in the Boise State record books. His 2,411 career rushing yards rank 10th at Boise State, his 33 rushing touchdowns seventh and his 44 total touchdowns fifth all-time. McNichols has posted 12 100-yard rushing games in his career, seventh-best at Boise State while he is one of just two Broncos to post at least two 200-yard rushing games. His total of six career 200-all-purpose-yard performances is tied for second in school history, just two back of leader Brock Forsey.

SPERBECK TAKES OVER AS BOISE STATE'S BEST: Senior wide receiver Thomas Sperbeck, the only current Bronco voted by the fans to the 30-Year All-Blue Team, made nine catches for 109 yards and a touchdown in Thursday's 28-27 win over BYU, but it was a 20-yard reception in the first quarter that stood out. That catch pushed Sperbeck to 3,075 career receiving yards, passing Titus Young (3,063 yards) as Boise State's all-time leader.

The performance continued Sperbeck's ascent up multiple categories of the Boise State record book, as he now stands fifth all-time with 191 receptions (53 behind all-time leader Matt Miller). His 109 receiving yards Thursday against BYU also marked the 13th 100-yard receiving game of his career, bringing him into a tie with Boise State's all-time leader Ryan Ikebe (1993-96).

With seven games under his belt, Sperbeck leads the Mountain West with 810 receiving yards and seven touchdown catches and is second with 47 receptions, a season after leading the conference in receiving yardage with a Boise State single-season record 1,412 as well as with 88 receptions, which tied Miller's Boise State single-season record.

WAIT, HOW MANY QUARTERBACKS DO YOU GUYS HAVE?: Despite the Bronco roster listing five players at quarterback, Boise State in fact retains the services of a couple of converted signal-callers in wide receivers Cedrick Wilson and Thomas Sperbeck. Sperbeck's throwing prowess was on display again Oct. 15 against Colorado State, as he took a direct snap out of the Wildcat and found A.J. Richardson for an 11-yard touchdown for Boise State's final points of the night.

Sperbeck and Wilson are now each 2-for-2 passing on the season, with Sperbeck throwing for 59 yards and a pair of touchdowns, while Wilson has thrown for 84 yards and a score.

Former prep quarterbacks, the pair showed off their talents at their former positions Sept. 24 at Oregon State as Wilson completed a 23-yard pass to tight end Alec Dhaenens, and Sperbeck took a snap from the Wildcat and ran for nine yards. Wilson added to his numbers Oct. 1 against Utah State, completing a 61-yard touchdown pass to Jeremy McNichols.

#RYPITGOOD: Boise State quarterback Brett Rypien remains the standard-bearer among Mountain West quarterbacks after throwing for 442 yards and three touchdowns in Thursday's win over BYU. Through seven games, Rypien leads the conference in passing yards (2,064, 294.9 ypg), passing touchdowns (15) and total offense (2,056 yards, 293.7 ypg).

For Rypien Thursday marked his third-career 400-yard passing effort, tying Kellen Moore for second-most all-time, and just one behind leader Ryan Dinwiddie (2000-03). It was also Rypien's eighth-career 300-yard passing game, fourth all-time at Boise State, and with 317 passing yards at halftime against BYU it was the third time this season in which he had 300 passing yards by halftime (304 yards at Louisiana on Sept. 3, 368 at New Mexico on Oct. 7).

He had his best game of the season Oct. 7 at New Mexico, completing 21-of-28 passes for 391 yards and a career-best five touchdowns in the

GAME NOTES

49-21 win. Rypien put up these numbers in just over a half of action, as he threw for 368 yards and five scores by halftime, and on his only drive of the second half took the Broncos downfield for a touchdown to make it 49-7.

WILSON JUST KEEPS CATCHING TOUCHDOWNS: Junior wide receiver Cedrick Wilson continued his strong debut season for the Broncos Thursday, catching four passes for 68 yards and a touchdown, his sixth of the season.

Wilson put up a career day Oct. 7 at New Mexico, posting career bests in catches (nine), receiving yards (167) and touchdown catches (three) in just over a half of action. Wilson caught all three of his touchdowns in the first half, putting him in a tie for the team lead with five on the year. So far this season, Wilson, despite limited action Oct. 15 against Colorado State, has caught 27 passes for 500 yards and six scores, with the touchdown mark tied for second in the Mountain West. Wilson also ranks sixth in the conference in receiving yards per game (71.4) and third in yards per reception (18.5).

POWER PUNTING: Redshirt senior Sean Wale is having a career year in 2016, ranking 15th in the country and third in the Mountain West with a 45.0 punting average. Of his 30 punts this season, Wale has dropped 11 inside the opponents' 20-yard line and only one has gone for a touchback. Additionally, 16 of his punts have been fair-caught.

Wale, with a 3.84 cumulative grade-point average has also been recognized for his work in the classroom, being named a William V. Campbell Trophy semifinalist in 2016, and being voted to the 2015 CoSIDA Academic All-District 7 Team.

DOESN'T MATTER WHO THROWS IT, McNICHOLS WILL CATCH IT: While Jeremy McNichols has made his bones at Boise State as a running back, he remains a dangerous option as a receiver. Thursday against BYU he caught five passes for a career-best 109 yards and a touchdown, with the scoring catch going for a career-long 76 yards. Also this season, McNichols has caught a touchdown from three different passers (Thomas Sperbeck at Louisiana and Cedrick Wilson against Colorado State, along with two receptions from Brett Rypien this season).

So far in 2016, McNichols is third on the team with 25 catches for 372 yards and four touchdowns.

UP THERE WITH THE OFFENSE: Boise State put up 571 yards of offense against BYU Thursday, and now ranks 29th in the nation with 481.6 yards per game. This figure is helped by a passing attack that ranks 15th in the nation with 320.6 yards per game, and a rushing attack that cranks out 161.0 yards per contest, ranking 80th in the country.

Scoring-wise, the Broncos rank 38th in the country and third in the Mountain West with 34.3 points per game.

RYPIEN-TO-SPERBECK: When Brett Rypien took the reins as Boise State's starting quarterback in 2015, he formed a productive partnership with wide receiver Thomas Sperbeck. Since Rypien's first series behind center, coming on Boise State's second possession of the third quarter against Idaho State (Sept. 18, 2015), he and Sperbeck teamed up 82 times for 1,382 yards and nine touchdowns in 2015.

That connection picked right up in 2016, as Rypien has found Sperbeck 38 times for 701 yards and six touchdowns over the first six games.

SHUTOUT STREAK: Boise State has not been shutout in 245 consecutive games, the ninth-longest active streak in the country and the 16th-longest streak in NCAA history. The last shutout came on the road against No. 15 Washington State, Sept. 27, 1997 (58-0). The loss to the Cougars is one of only two shutouts the Broncos have suffered since becoming a four-year institution in 1968.

Last season Marcus Henry started all 13 games at center, and was picked up by the New Orleans Saints as a free agent, and Rees Odhiambo, a third-round selection by the Seattle Seahawks, started eight games at left tackle. According to Phil Steele, the Broncos' '95 returning starts along the offensive line ranks 14th nationally entering 2016.

>> Ranked third on the team with 57 tackles (32 solo) in 2015, and tied for second with a pair of forced fumbles and tied for fourth with 8.0 tackles-for-loss over 12 games (10 starts).

>> Blocked a punt and a field goal, earning himself Mountain West Special Teams Player of the Week, against Idaho State.

>> Named Defensive MVP of both the 2014 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship and the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl.

>> Named Mountain West Special Teams Player of the Week (Sept. 26) after averaging 46.5 yards over six punts at Oregon State. Also had three punts of 50-plus yards, and three that landed inside the 20 in that contest.

>> Posted career bests in catches (nine), receiving yards (167) and touchdown catches (three) at New Mexico (Oct. 7).

>> Caught seven passes for 113 yards and a touchdown in his Boise State debut Sept. 3 at Louisiana, and added three catches for 85 yards against Washington State (Sept. 10).

>> Was an NJCAA All-American at Coffeyville Community College in 2015 after catching 66 passes for 1,045 yards and 17 touchdowns. Ranked third nationally with 116.1 receiving yards per game and fourth in touchdown receptions.

>> Finished his two-year stay at Coffeyville with 1,674 receiving yards and 27 touchdown catches.

Bryan Harsin, a former Boise State quarterback, assistant coach and offensive coordinator, is in his third season as the head coach at his alma mater.

In his debut season Harsin led his alma mater back to where it rose to national prominence. Boise State went 12-2 in Harsin's inaugural season, winning its first outright Mountain West Championship, and capping the campaign with a 38-30 victory over Arizona in the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl.

The victory in the Fiesta Bowl was the third such win for the Broncos in the previous nine seasons. Harsin, serving as offensive coordinator in the first two Fiesta Bowl victories, has been a part of each of the school's three appearances in the game.

The team's victory in the 2014 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship marked the team's first outright league title since joining the league in 2011, and the first overall since 2009. The only alumnus to lead the Broncos as head coach in the history of Boise State, Harsin has now won a conference championship as a student-athlete, assistant coach and head coach.

In 2015, the Broncos went 9-4, climbing as high as No. 20 in both the Associated Press and USA Today Coaches Polls. The Broncos concluded the 2014 season ranked No. 16 each poll.

Boise State capped the 2015 campaign with a 55-7 victory over Northern Illinois in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, the fifth-largest margin of victory the history of bowl games.

For his efforts in 2014, Harsin was named a finalist for the Paul "Bear Bryant" National Coach of the Year Award, the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award and the Dodd Trophy, given annually by the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year Foundation. He was also named the nation's top first-year head coach by the Football Writers Association of America.

In addition to rejoining the national rankings - Boise State ranked 20th nationally in the final College Football Playoff Top 25 - the Broncos' offense also returned the nation's elite. Boise State concluded the 2014 season ranked ninth nationally in scoring offense (39.7) and 14th nationally in total offense (494.3). The team concluded the 2015 season ranked 15th nationally in both scoring offense (39.1) and total offense (501.5). The Broncos also concluded the 2015 season ranked 16th nationally in passing offense (310.2). For his efforts, Rypien was named first-team All-Mountain West, in addition to garnering MW Freshman of the Year honors.

Harsin was named head coach, Dec. 11, 2013. A graduate of Capital High School in Boise, he played quarterback for the Broncos from 1995-99.

Harsin and his wife Kes have two daughters, Devyn Lynn and Dayn Mykena, and a son, Davis.

ONCE A BRONCO...

The Boise State coaching staff boasts a combined 96 years of previous experience with the Broncos, including 46 years in the program as student-athletes and 50 years as assistant coaches. The staff also features five alumni (Harsin, Avalos, Franklin, Huff, Marks), which is the second-most among all FBS coaching staffs (Air Force has seven alumni on its coaching staff). GAMES AGAINST THE POWER FIVE

The Broncos are 14-5 against schools from conferences that comprise the Resource Five since the start of the 2006 season, including a current streak of five-straight wins: Arizona in the VIZIO Fiesta Bowl (Dec. 31, 2014; 38-30), Washington (16-13; Sept. 4, 2015), Virginia (56-14; Sept. 25, 2015), Washington State (31-28; Sept. 10, 2016) and Oregon State (38-24; Sept. 24, 2016). Also included was a streak of six-consecutive victories, which was snapped in the 2012 season opener against Michigan State.

Since notching its first such victory, a 34-16 win over Iowa State in the 2002 Humanitarian Bowl, the Broncos have gone 16-9. Boise State is 16-21 all-time in such games.

ALBERTSONS STADIUM / THE BLUE



Albertsons Stadium - and Lyle Smith Field - is the home of Boise State football and the annual Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

Smith is the undisputed father of Bronco football, who from 1946-67 built one of the top junior college programs in the country. When he retired from his head coaching position to become the athletic director, Smith had a record of 156-25-6 (.850).

Completed during the summer of 1970 at a cost of \$2.2 million, what was originally known as Bronco Stadium had a seating capacity of 14,500. Since that time the stadium has expanded four times to its current capacity of 36,387.

Boise State established a first in 1986 by installing the first blue AstroTurf in the country. The second blue AstroTurf field was installed in 1995, with the third going in prior to the 2002 season. The first Blue FieldTurf surface was installed in 2008. A second Blue FieldTurf field was installed prior to the 2010 season, making a total of five different blue fields at the stadium.

Boise State's was the first collegiate stadium to have the entire field produced in a special color.



Since 1986, Boise State is a combined 169-36 on The Blue, a winning percentage of .824. And since 2000, Boise State has gone 100-6 at home (.943), the highest winning percentage in the country during that time.

Overall, since the construction of Albertsons Stadium in 1970, Boise State is 252-53 (.826), the highest winning percentage of any stadium in the country built before 1980.
