SATURDAY'S PREVIEW...

After its bye week, **UNLV (3-6/2-3)** returns to action by hosting first-place **Wyoming (7-2/5-0)** for the first time since 2012 with the season's earliest kick time on Saturday ... The game, part of UNLV Athletics' HEROES WEEK, will be televised by ROOT SPORTS, which is available in Southern Nevada by satellite only (DirecTV 674/DISH 5414 HD) ... However, those outside of the ROOT footprint can watch the game online for free via the Mountain West Network at unlvrebels.com ... The Rebels are playing for their first win over the Cowboys since 2010 ... Last time out, UNLV fell at San Jose State 30-24 on Oct. 29 while the Cowboys won their fifth straight by downing Utah State 52-28 Saturday night ... Despite giving up a season-high three QB sacks during their last outing, UNLV has allowed just seven through nine games this season, which ranks fifth in the nation, just one year after allowing 33, which ranked 106th ... The Rebels have had four different players post at least one 100-yard rushing effort a combined eight times this fall: RBs **Lexington Thomas** (four times) and **Charles Williams** (two times) and QBs **Johnny Stanton** and **Dalton Sneed** ... Williams needs just 24 yards to set a UNLV record for most net rushing yards in a season, passing **James Wofford's** 624 in 1997 ... UNLV junior **Devonte Boyd** needs 13 receiving yards on Saturday to move past **Henry Bailey** (2,515 from 1991-94) into fifth place on the school's career list, 56 yards to move past **Damon Williams** (2,558 from 1995-98) into fourth and 102 to pass **Earvin Johnson** into third (2,604 from 2001-04) ... UNLV senior DB **Torry McTyer** is tied for fifth in the nation in passes defended per game with 1.5 ... Senior LB **Tau Lotulelei** leads the MW and is tied for 12th in the nation with 13.0 tackles-for-loss ... UNLV is tied for third in the nation with just two lost fumbles this season.

REBELS vs. COWBOYS NOTES...

UNLV is 6-5 vs. Wyoming in Las Vegas and has won two of the last three played at Sam Boyd Stadium ... Since the formation of the MW in 1999, UNLV has scored 448 points (30.0 PPG) vs. the Pokes ... Three of UNLV's 14 all-time overtime games have come against WYO -- and all of them took place in Las Vegas (1998, 2002, 2004) ... Formerly a series of streaks, UNLV won the first three games by a total of 13 points. WYO then had a four-game winning streak before UNLV's 1999 victory in Laramie sparked a five-game Rebel burst. UW then won every year from 2004-07 ... Because of MW divisional play, Saturday marks the last time the Rebels and Cowboys will meet in the regular season until 2019.

THE LAST TIME THEY MET (Nov. 28, 2015) WYOMING 35, UNLV 28

LARAMIE, Wyo. (AP) - Blake Decker threw three touchdowns, but it wasn't enough for the Rebels Saturday. **Brian Hill** rushed for 232 yards and a touchdown, setting a school record for rushing yards in a season, and **Cameron Coffman** tossed three touchdown passes as Wyoming beat UNLV 35-28. The Cowboys avoided setting a school record for losses in the season with the win. It was Hill's fifth 200-yard game of his career and fourth of the season as he broke the record with a 72-yard TD run on a third-and-2 play in the second quarter. UNLV (3-9, 2-6 Mountain West) renewed its series with Wyoming (2-10, 2-6) by traveling to Laramie for the first time since 2011. Temperature at kickoff was 18 degrees but clear and sunny for the noon kickoff. The Rebels took the lead early when Decker, who missed the previous game due to injury, connected with **Devonte Boyd** for a 22-yard touchdown. The Cowboys answered with two scores of their own in the second quarter and took a 14-7 lead into halftime. Wyoming upped its lead to 21-7 before Decker found **Kendal Keys** for an 8-yard touchdown. The Rebels tied the game early in the final quarter of the season when Decker hooked up with freshman **Brandon Presley** for a 22-yard score. After a Cowboy touchdown, **Kurt Palandech** evened the game again after running in for a touchdown from 10 yards out. The Cowboys then marched down the field and scored with 2:20 left in the game. UNLV was led by Decker, who passed for 270 yards in addition to the three TDs. Boyd caught his seventh touchdown of the year and finished with six receptions for 122 yards, which marked his fifth 100-yard receiving game of the season.

WELCOME TO FABULOUS NEW UNIFORMS

UNLV football head coach **Tony Sanchez** said he is proud to make Las Vegas a prominent part of his team's appearance on the field. The words LAS VEGAS are found in all capital letters in UNLV's custom font along both legs of the white uniform while select diamonds from the iconic Stardust sign -- a nod to the city's popular Neon Museum Boneyard -- can be seen on the sides of both legs of the red pants and black pants. Also, the team went from one to three helmets since Sanchez's arrival as a black version was introduced vs. Fresno State to join last year's silver and red toppers. All of them include a three-inch-wide silver and black chrome version of the world-famous "Welcome to Fabulous Las Vegas" sign on the back. "Las Vegas is so important to our University and our football program wants to be a big part of the Las Vegas community," Sanchez said. "We are fortunate to live in one of the world's great destinations and these uniform designs are one of the ways we will proudly represent our city." UNLV had worn only a silver helmet for 33 straight years before the Sanchez era.

PALANDECH TO BECOME 3RD STARTING QB IN 2016


Junior **Kurt Palandech** is expected to make his first start of the season and fourth of his Rebel career on Saturday vs. Wyoming. Head coach **Tony Sanchez** announced the change after Palandech came off the bench to relieve five-game starter and redshirt freshman **Dalton Sneed** during UNLV's loss at San Jose State. Palandech completed 10 of 21 attempts for 161 yards and one touchdown and ran for 44 net yards and another score against the Spartans. Last season, the former JC transfer passed for 794 yards, nine TDs and five interceptions while spelling often-injured starter **Blake Decker**. He also finished with 293 yards and four TDs on the ground. Palandech would become the third starter at QB for the team this season, the first time that has happened at UNLV since 2011 (**Caleb Herring**, **Sean Reilly** and **Taylor Barnhill**). Sneed, who has won two of his five starts, took over after **Johnny Stanton** suffered an injury during the Idaho game on Sept. 24. Sanchez said Stanton could also see the field in a limited role moving forward.

Tony Sanchez, who built a national powerhouse at Las Vegas' Bishop Gorman High School, is now well on his way to creating another consistent winner in town as the 11th head coach in UNLV football history.

Named to the job by UNLV Director of Athletics Tina Kunzer-Murphy on Dec. 11, 2014, Sanchez guided the Rebels to three victories in his first season, which marked only the fourth time in the last 12 years that the program won more than two games. The first Rebel coach to win at least three times in his first season since Hall of Famer John Robinson in 1999, Sanchez's debut season was highlighted by defeating in-state rival Nevada, Reno on the road and bringing home the famed Fremont Cannon to the UNLV campus. Under the new staff, the Rebels also became competitive on a near-weekly basis, either leading or trailing by just a touchdown during the fourth quarter in nine of their 12 games.

Sanchez, who turned 42 in January, became a rising star in coaching circles after spending the previous six seasons leading Bishop Gorman to an overall record of 85-5 and six consecutive state 4A championships to go with a top-25 national ranking each year. His 2014 top-ranked Gaels squad finished 15-0 and won the mythical national championship.

"I'm fired up and ready to create excitement in the Las Vegas community and make the Rebels everybody's football team," Sanchez said on the day he was hired. "UNLV is a great university. With this community's help, we're going to make it a great football place."

Sanchez was well decorated for his efforts in his final season with the Gaels, being named USA TODAY's All-USA Coach of the Year as well as the U.S. Army All-American Bowl National Coach of the Year and the Rawlings National High School Coach of the Year. His overall record as a head coach was 120-26 after having also spent five seasons leading California High School in San Roman, California, before coming to Southern Nevada. He also was part of staffs at Onate High School in Las Cruces, NM, and Irvin High School in El Paso, TX.

The winning head coach at the 2014 All-American Bowl in San Antonio, Sanchez saw 41 of his players earn collegiate football scholarships during his time in Las Vegas, including 31 to FBS programs. Now he has attracted national attention as only the fifth man in the modern era of college football to go from the high school level directly to the position of head coach of an FBS team.

Sanchez's first major statement as the leader of the Rebels was to quickly attract a top-notch, experienced staff that was highlighted by Nebraska offensive coordinator Barney Cotton and Colorado defensive coordinator Kent Baer.

Dividends from the impressive list of assistants joining Sanchez began immediately as just over a month later, the group secured a recruiting class that was ranked in the upper half of the Mountain West Conference by multiple national outlets. One year later, the Rebels' class was one of the program's best ever as it included a school-record 10 three-star signees.

One of the youngest head coaches on the FBS level, Sanchez is a 1992 graduate of Granada High School in Livermore, CA. A decorated two-way player, he went on to become a standout receiver at Laney College in Oakland before transferring to New Mexico State. He would letter two seasons for the Aggies and finish his senior campaign with 42 receptions for 546 yards, including grabbing five passes for 80 yards at Sam Boyd Stadium when he played against UNLV on Nov. 18, 1995. His first taste of coaching came the next season when he served as an undergraduate assistant at his alma mater.

The son of a career policeman in the Oakland area, Sanchez was born Jan. 25, 1974, at Travis Air Force Base in California while his father was serving in the military. He earned a bachelor's degree in family and consumer science from NMSU in 1998 and then his master's in special education in 2003. He and his wife, Tessie, have two children: daughter, Alyssa, and son, Jason.

LEX EDUCATION



Lexington Thomas didn't even start a game in 2015 but was so dynamic that he managed to tie the school freshman record for 100-yard rushing games in a season with three such outings (**Dionza Bradford** in 2011 and **Omar Love** in 1992). In fact, Thomas ranked ninth in the nation with a per-carry average of 6.24 among all freshmen with at least 500 net rushing yards. In his sophomore debut, Thomas finished with 68 yards and two TDs on just 11 carries in a blowout victory over Jackson State. Since then, he has finished with less than a 100 yards just twice. He bolted for 112 yards on 19 attempts vs. UCLA at the Rose Bowl in Week Two, 113 yards on 17 carries at Central Michigan one week later and a career-high 160 vs. Idaho on just 19 attempts Sept. 24. He has five century-mark efforts in his last 10 games dating back to last season and comes into Saturday with seven in just 20 career outings. That total of seven already ties him with two other backs for 11th on the school's career list for 100-yard games. Lex has gone long this year as well. He had a 55-yarder scoring sprint vs. Idaho just one week after going untouched for an 85-yard TD run against CMU. That marked the longest run by a Rebel RB since **Darin Brightmon's** school-record 89-yarder vs. New Mexico State in 1989.

ON-FIELD SALUTE TO THE LATE RICH ABAJIAN



Three red letters outlined in black spelling out "BAJ" are prominently displayed on UNLV's home turf this fall to honor the memory of **Rich Abajian**, who passed away suddenly in February. BAJ was a former assistant coach with the program and then spent the next three decades as arguably its greatest supporter. "Rich was a giant in this community when it came to being successful in business and then using that success to help others. His love of this city, of UNLV and especially the Rebel football program is well known," said UNLV Director of

Athletics **Tina Kunzer-Murphy**. A native of Walla Walla, Washington, and 1975 graduate of the University of Nevada, Reno, where he played as a defensive back, Abajian joined UNLV in 1977 as a graduate assistant coach and then served as defensive secondary coach under **Tony Knap** from 1979-81. Soon after he went into the automobile sales business with **Cliff Findlay** and became one of the nation's most successful dealership general managers.

TAU TAKES IT

UNLV senior linebacker **Tau Lotulelei** was named the Mountain West Conference Defensive Player of the Week on Oct. 19. Lotulelei was the first Rebel football player to earn a weekly MW honor this season after he posted seven total tackles, including 1.5 tackles-for-loss in his team's 41-38 victory at Hawai'i. It was Lotulelei's forced fumble late in the fourth quarter, however, that made the biggest impact as he chased down Rainbow Warrior **Dru Brown** from behind after the quarterback ran for first down at the UNLV 47-yard line. Lotulelei popped the ball loose and it was recovered by defensive back Darius Mouton. UNLV then drove down to set up a game-winning 28-yard field goal by **Evan Pantels** that made the Rebels winners on the islands for only the third time ever and first time since 2000.

UNLV honors candidate Devonte Boyd is an already highly decorated young receiver who was a unanimous preseason All-MW First Team selection among the publications for the second straight year. In 2014 he became just the third Rebel named to the Football Writers Association of America Freshman All-America Team. He was also just the fifth UNLV player to be named his conference's Freshman of the Year after leading the nation in receiving yards among freshmen during the regular season and finishing 38th overall with 980. Boyd, who represented his program's offense at this summer's MW Media Days, has caught at least one pass in all but one of the 34 games of his career. He piled up more receiving yards through a sophomore season than any Rebel in history as his 1,884 topped the school's all-time leader Ryan Wolfe, who had 1,695 in his first two seasons. Boyd is already one

of just three UNLV players to ever post more than one 900-yard season, joining Wolfe (2006, '08) and Demond Thompkins, who was the first to do it in consecutive campaigns in 1992, '93. A local signee

from Henderson's Basic High School, Boyd is a New Orleans native who moved to Southern Nevada a decade ago to live with relatives after his family was hit hard by Hurricane Katrina. As a rookie in 2014 he shattered the school's freshman records for yards and catches (65) in a season and for receptions in a game with 11 vs. New Mexico. He made an immediate impact for UNLV as he caught six passes for 102 yards in his first collegiate game at Arizona, which made him only the second UNLV freshman in history to reach the 100-yard receiving mark in his first game. He is currently third at UNLV with 10 career 100-yard games, including a record-tying three straight last fall. He needs just one more reception to move into UNLV's career top-10 list for catches.

STATES OF THE PROGRAM

From Hawaii to Florida to Finland -- the 2016 Rebels come from hometowns spread across the globe. In fact, no less than 13 different states, two countries and one U.S. territory (American Samoa) are represented on this year's roster. While a vast majority of Rebels naturally hail from California (39) and Nevada (22), a state that continues to become even more fertile recruiting ground is Texas as currently seven UNLV players are products of the Lone Star State. Meanwhile, nearby Arizona is also home to no less than seven current Rebels and a trio of players hail from Washington state. Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Minnesota, New Jersey, Ohio and Pennsylvania are each represented. Las Vegas, of course, is nicknamed the "Ninth Island" by Hawaiians, which is one reason a whopping 10 players from that state are on this season's roster.

TEXAS THREE-STEP IN BACKFIELD

It's been well-chronicled how many quality players from the state of Texas have recently come through the UNLV football program, including all-time leading rusher **Tim Cornett** and arguably the school's best receiver of all-time in **Devante Davis**. The idea that everything is bigger in Texas is spilling over to this year's roster as no less than eight current Rebels are from the Lone Star State. The Texans are especially prominent in the offensive backfield as three of the top runners are from the Houston or Dallas areas. Team captain **David Greene**, who can line up at both fullback and tailback, is the only senior while **Lexington Thomas** and **Xzaviar Campbell (Lex & X)** finished second (506) and third (469) in rushing yards for the Rebels last season. A Texan, in fact, has led UNLV in rushing in five of the last six seasons.

BOYD BACK ON BILETNIKOFF LIST

For the second consecutive year UNLV wide receiver **Devonte Boyd** was named to the official pre-season watch list for the Biletnikoff Award, which goes each season to the nation's top pass catcher. The Tallahassee Quarterback Club Foundation, the Florida-based creator and sponsor of the Biletnikoff Award, released the 2016 preseason list. The winner is selected by the Biletnikoff Award National Selection Committee, a group of college football journalists, commentators and former receivers. The 10 Biletnikoff Award semifinalists will be announced on November 14 and three finalists will be declared, following another vote, on November 22. The 2016 winner will be presented live on December 8 during The Home Depot College Football Awards Show on ESPN. Boyd, a graduate of Henderson's Basic High School, was a unanimous choice for 2016 Preseason First Team All-Mountain West by Lindy's, Athlon, Sporting News, ESPN and Phil Steele's preview publications. The honors candidate has caught at least one pass in all 25 games of his career and piled up more receiving yards through a sophomore season than any Rebel in history with 1,884. Boyd, who posted five 100-yard receiving games last fall, also became the third UNLV player to reach 900 yards in more than one season when he finished with 54 catches for 904 yards and seven touchdowns in 2015.

LINCOLN TO LAS VEGAS

UNLV's staff has a definite Cornhusker flavor to it. Offensive coordinator/tight ends coach **Barney Cotton** played for legendary coach **Tom Osborne** in Lincoln and spent eight years in two stints on the Nebraska staff, even leading the team as interim head coach in its Holiday Bowl appearance against USC in 2014. Offensive line coach/run game coordinator **John Garrison** also played for the Huskers, including serving as center in the BCS Championship game for the 2001 squad, and spent the previous four years with Cotton on the NU staff. First-year defensive line coach **Tony Samuel** played four seasons for the Huskers and later coached them for 11 (1986-96). Graduate assistant **Ben Cotton** made 39 career starts at tight end for Nebraska from 2009-12 while fellow-GA **Cody Green** played quarterback for Big Red in 2009-10 before finishing his playing career at Tulsa.

LEX ON TEX LIST

UNLV sophomore running back **Lexington Thomas** was one of 41 players named to the official watch list for the fourth annual Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award. The award honors the nation's top college football offensive player who was either born in Texas, graduated from a Texas high school or plays at a college located in the Lone Star State. The honoree must also exhibit the enduring characteristics that define the award's namesake -- former NFL running back great **Earl Campbell** (nicknamed the Tyler Rose) -- including integrity, performance, teamwork, sportsmanship, drive, community and tenacity. A 2015 graduate of Benjamin Davis High School in Aldine, Texas, Thomas was the top freshman runner in the Mountain West last season. He finished second on the team with 506 net rushing yards and three touchdowns on just 81 attempts for a gaudy per-carry average of 6.2, which ranked ninth in the country among freshman backs with at least 500 yards. Despite coming off the bench, he tied the school's freshman record for 100-yard games with three. The Watch



List will be narrowed to up to 16 semifinalists in November and then up to five finalists in December. They will be selected by broadcasters, commentators, journalists, fans and the previous winner. The finalists will be brought to Tyler for The Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Banquet scheduled for Jan. 11, 2017. Houston quarterback **Greg Ward** was last year's award recipient.

RECEIVER U?

Devonte Boyd piled up more receiving yards through a sophomore season than any Rebel in history as his 1,884 topped the school's all-time leader **Ryan Wolfe**, who had 1,695 in his first two seasons en route to 3,495 in his career from 2006-09. Boyd is already one of just three UNLV players to ever post more than one 900-yard season, joining Wolfe (2006, '08) and **Demond Thompkins**, who was the first to do it in consecutive campaigns in 1992, '93. Boyd, a former FWAA Freshman All-America and Mountain West Conference Freshman of the Year in 2014, was named second team All-MW last fall and is a unanimous preseason first team pick in 2016. It marked the sixth time in the last 10 years that UNLV placed a WR on the All-MW first or second teams and, remarkably, five of the program's six all-time leaders in receptions have played since the MW was formed in 1999 (Wolfe, **Casey Flair**, **Devante Davis**, **Earvin Johnson** and **Phillip Payne**).

SANCHEZ PART OF SELECT COACHING GROUP

UNLV's **Tony Sanchez** is just the fifth man in the modern era of college football to move directly from being a head coach at a high school to being head coach at a university that was part of what is now known as the FBS. Sanchez, of course, only had to move across the city after going 85-5 in six seasons while leading 2014 national champion Bishop Gorman High School in Las Vegas. **Jim Bradley**, who passed away in 2015, was the first to do it when he went across town to take over at NMSU.

LOTULELEI NAMED TO POLY AWARD LIST

UNLV linebacker **Tau Lotulelei** was named to the 2016 Polynesian College Football Player of the Year Watch List. The senior, who was also on the same list in 2015, joins five other players from Mountain West schools and 38 overall this fall. Lotulelei, native of Kihei, Hawaii, was named 2016 preseason First Team All-Mountain West by Phil Steele's, Sporting News and ESPN and second team by Lindy's. Last year he started nine games for the Rebels and still managed honorable mention All-MW despite missing significant time with injury. He ranked 15th in the league with 7.0 tackles per game and led the team with 11.5 tackles-for-loss and three quarterback sacks. He enters his final collegiate season with 201 career tackles, 26 TFL and six sacks. The award is presented annually to the most outstanding Polynesian college football player that epitomizes great ability and integrity. Former University of Oregon, and current Tennessee Titans Quarterback, **Marcus Mariota** was selected as the inaugural recipient of the Award in 2014 and former University of Notre Dame, and current Baltimore Ravens Offensive Lineman, **Ronnie Stanley**, who was coached in high school by **Tony Sanchez**, received last year's honor. The winner of the 2016 Polynesian College Football Player of the Year Award will be announced on Dec. 7, 2016. Five finalists will be unveiled November 17. The formal presentation of the award will be held at the Celebration Dinner during the Polynesian Football Hall of Fame Enshrinement Weekend on Jan. 20, 2017. The Watch List candidates were selected based on past performance and future potential. The finalists and the winner will be chosen by the Polynesian Football Hall of Fame Selection Committee, which includes Coaches **Dick Tomey** (Chairman), **LaVell Edwards**, **Ron McBride** and **Dick Vermeil**, past NFLPA President and Inaugural Inductee **Kevin Mawae**, ESPN Sportscaster **Neil Everett**, NFL player personnel legend **Gil Brandt** and Honolulu Sportscaster **Robert Kekaula**.

KREITLER IS MAN IN THE MIDDLE



UNLV senior offensive lineman **Will Kreitler** (pronounced KRITE-ler) is part of the official Fall Watch List released by the Rimington Trophy Committee. The Rimington Trophy is presented annually to the most outstanding center in college football. Kreitler earned 2015 Honorable Mention All-Mountain West Conference and is a 2016 preseason Second Team All-MW choice by Phil Steele's and a third-team pick by Athon. The native of Gilbert, Arizona, was one of UNLV head coach **Tony Sanchez**'s first recruits and the

midyear transfer from Scottsdale Community College did not disappoint for the Rebels. He started all 12 games in the middle and only allowed one quarterback sack while leading a line that helped three different running backs combine for five 100-yard rushing efforts. The finalists for the Rimington will be announced December 5 and the winner will be recognized at the Rimington Trophy Presentation at the Rococo Theatre in Lincoln, Nebraska, on Jan. 14, 2017.

THE YOUNG-INS

UNLV saw five true freshmen play in the 2016 opener (all offensive players: OL **Jaron Caldwell**, OL **Julio Garcia**, RB **Charles Williams**, WR **Mekhi Stevenson** and WR **Elijah Trosclair**. Williams, who moved up the depth chart during camp to No. 2 at tailback, came in to lead the team in rushing with 96 net yards on just 12 carries, including a 17-yard touchdown run. In addition, redshirt freshman DB **Evan Austrie** and OL **Justin Polu** made their first career starts. Redshirt freshmen seeing action were DB **Soli Afalava**, DL **Nick Dehdashtian**, DB **Jericho Flowers**, DB **Javin White**, LB **Gabe McCoy**, QB **Dalton Sneed** and WR **Darren Woods** to make it 14 total freshmen on the field vs. Jackson State. In the recent past, the Rebels played 11 (2015), 5 (2014), 11 (2013), 7 (2012), 13 (2011) and 14 (2010) total freshmen in the first game of the year.

UNLV football's radio broadcasts, including the coach's show, can be heard again in Southern Nevada this fall on ESPN 1100 AM and on 100.9 FM. The UNLV IMG College Network includes an affiliate to the north, Reno radio station Fox Sports Radio 1450 AM, which is also owned by Lotus Broadcasting. **Russ Langer** enters his fourth season as the team's play-by-play voice after completing his 17th season calling the action for the Las Vegas 51s, which is the Triple-A affiliate of the New York Mets. Joining him in the booth is former college and NFL star **Mike Pritchard**, who is in his 11th season as the school's analyst.




SANCHEZ WEEKLY RADIO SHOW

The "Tony Sanchez Radio Show" will be broadcast live each Wednesday from 6-7 p.m. PT. This marks the sixth straight year that the UNLV coach's radio show will originate from Born And Raised Tavern & Lounge in Summerlin. The show is broadcast live on ESPN 1100 AM and 100.9 FM. Fans are invited to come and join Coach Sanchez, UNLV football play-by-play radio announcer **Russ Langer** and ESPN Radio personality and UNLV radio analyst **Mike Pritchard** in person each week during the season.



ONE-OF-A-KIND DESIGN

Sam Boyd Stadium underwent a \$1.2 million renovation on its field level in the summer of 2015 that included a new \$800,000 playing surface. Two rows of seats on both the West and East sides were eliminated to create a wider field and a new official stadium capacity for football of 35,500. The highlight of the project, however, was the installation of a new football field for the first time since 2003. The state-of-the-art, 100-percent Made in the USA, SPRINTURF synthetic surface features a shock pad for player safety. Given the advantages of a blank green canvas with no sewn-in markings, UNLV head coach **Tony Sanchez** looked to go bold with the program's new field design and the Vegas-themed look made national news when the rendering was released in August of last year. The world-famous "Welcome to Fabulous Las Vegas" sign makes an appearance in the black end zones along with "REBELS" in red. Yardage numbers are displayed in a unique retro Las Vegas font and lay atop red and gray diamonds made famous in the iconic old Stardust hotel sign. The 50-yard-line markers are gray sunbursts taken from the top of the aforementioned Las Vegas sign. Finally, a gray strip borders the entire field. The entire design, including the Mountain West Conference logos and midfield UNLV primary logo, is painted by stadium personnel in the final weeks leading up to kickoff.

HOLD IT!

A positive recent trait UNLV carried over into the **Tony Sanchez** coaching era is the ability to hold on to the football. Exhibit A: the 2015 Rebels tied for fourth in the nation for fewest lost fumbles last season with just four, three of which came from the quarterback spot (**Kurt Palandech** vs. UCLA and SDSU, **Blake Decker** vs. Hawai'i). In fact, when freshman **Lexington Thomas** lost the ball after a seven-yard rush against the Aztecs, it marked the first lost fumble by a Rebel running back in exactly two years. UNLV had gone 646 straight carries since its last lost fumble on a RB carry on Nov. 21, 2013, at Air Force. That came just a year after the program set a school record for fewest lost fumbles in a season with three. That 2014 total bested the previous record of five given away in 2013, 2009 and 1999. In fact, as a team, the Rebels came into this fall averaging just 5.16 lost fumbles per year since the start of the 2010 season (31 given away in the last 76 games).

GREENE WEARING WIESNER JERSEY


During UNLV's home-opening football game vs. Jackson State, senior running back **David Greene Jr.** was recognized as this year's recipient of the Tom Wiesner Award (pronounced "WEEZE-ner). For the 15th consecutive year, coaches and seniors on the football team selected the player who best exemplifies the courage, enthusiasm, dedication and toughness of the late



Mr. **Tom Wiesner**. Greene, a three-year letterman from Dallas, Texas, who is also one of four team captains this fall, is just the third running back to be selected to wear the "Wiesner Jersey" during a season. A Wisconsin native and three-time letterman on the Badger football team, Mr. Wiesner sought his fortune out West and became one of the Las Vegas' leading businessmen, philanthropists, politicians and ambassadors. The founder of the successful restaurants that are part of Big Dog's Hospitality Group, Mr. Wiesner helped guide Rebel Athletics from their infancy and was inducted into the UNLV Athletics Hall of Fame as a Distinguished Contributor in 1994. Also a member of the Nevada Board of Regents, he died in 2002 at the age of 63 after a battle with Leukemia.

BIG D TD

After going two entire seasons without a defensive touchdown, UNLV has turned in six in the last 17 games dating back to last year. The opener vs. Jackson State saw two such scores in the third quarter. First, big man **Nick Dehdashtian**, playing in his first collegiate game, picked up a fumble and rumbled 28 yards into the end zone. Then, just a few plays later, senior CB **Torry McTyer** brought in his second career interception and returned it 43 yards for a score to close out the third quarter. At SDSU on Oct. 8, DL **Dominic Baldwin** got into the act when he scooped and scored from 20 yards out after DL **Jeremiah Valoaga** sacked the Aztec QB and caused a fumble. Last fall, after nearly five years without returning an interception for a touchdown, the UNLV defense posted one in back-to-back games. Against Idaho State, DB **Troy Hawthorne** took an interception back for a 47-yard score. Remarkably, it marked the first pick-six for a Rebel player since **Will Chandler** returned one 19 yards vs. Wisconsin in 2010. One week later, at Nevada, Reno, LB **Ryan McAleenan** returned an INT 52 yards to help secure the victory at Mackay Stadium. Then, against Boise State, DB **Fred Wilson** scooped and scored from one yard out to mark the program's first fumble return for a TD since doing it at Boise State in 2012.





RECORD GIFT ANNOUNCED FOR FERTITTA FOOTBALL COMPLEX

UNLV Athletics announced the largest single gift in its history on September 13 as the Fertitta Family has pledged \$10 million toward the construction of a state-of-the-art football training facility, which will be known as the Fertitta Football Complex. The 73,000-square-foot, two-level complex will be built on campus in the north end of the team's practice area and overlook the Ernie Becker Sr. Football Fields at Bill "Wildcat" Morris Rebel Park. The Fertitta Football Complex will become the day-to-day home of the program and include an academic center, locker rooms, offices, meeting rooms, strength & conditioning center, media room, training table and nutrition bar, athletic training center and player lounge.

The **Fertitta Family** had the following statement: "We believe in the future of Rebel Football under Tony Sanchez's leadership and are proud to join others in the community in helping make this vital building block for the program become a reality."

A lead gift of \$2 million, which was previously the largest ever earmarked for UNLV Football and came from a donor who wished to remain anonymous, was announced in late May. With this naming rights announcement, more than \$16 million has been pledged toward the project, which is expected to cost between \$24-26 million and begin construction in early spring and open to the student-athletes and staff approximately 10 months later.

"This is a day that will be long remembered at UNLV as it is the day that Rebel Football officially takes the next big step," said UNLV Director of Athletics **Tina Kunzer-Murphy**. "The lead gift we announced earlier this year got the ball rolling in this community and we have had a lot of people step up in major ways in order to help this program begin to reach its full potential. I thank the Fertittas for their program-changing gift and I know they join me in saying that we need more of the families of Southern Nevada to join the Rebels on this journey."

"As I've said since the day I was hired here, I am excited about the future of this program and its limitless potential," said second-year head coach **Tony Sanchez**. "I want to thank the Fertittas for not just this amazing gift but also for everything they do in the community. I also want to thank everyone else who has stepped up with significant and important contributions as they help us turn Rebel Football into a national program." The previous largest single gift to UNLV Athletics was \$7.2 million from the Mendenhall Family toward the construction of the men's basketball training facility in 2012.

"The Fertitta Family has been a longtime supporter of UNLV and we are grateful for the incredible generosity they have demonstrated over the years, including today," said UNLV President **Len Jessup**. "Having state-of-the-art facilities for athletics, particularly for football, contributes to the overall success of our programs and helps position the university for future realignment to a Power 5 Conference. Elevating UNLV Athletics is a critical part of our vision to become one of the best, top-tier public universities in the country."



PRACTICE PALACE

One of college football's largest and most impressive areas of its kind, Bill "Wildcat Morris Rebel Park has been transformed into an athletics showcase over the past decade. In 2010, a state-of-the-art UBU synthetic surface was installed at a cost of \$700,000, replacing an artificial surface originally installed in 2002 thanks to a \$1 million gift from the family of Ernie Becker Sr. The new surface and lighting system followed other donations secured since 1999, such as dozens of palm trees to line the fields and a desert garden built behind a Rebel Red archway welcoming fans, all of which have turned the park into one of the most aesthetically pleasing sports training facilities in the nation.

It didn't take long for Flowers to grow in to his new role as he caught two passes for 17 yards on the first offensive series at UH ... The move was made because the Rebels are without WR **Kendal Keys** in 2016 as the would-be junior underwent knee surgery in late August after an injury suffered late in camp. Keys, who hauled in 43 receptions for 515 yards and six touchdowns in 2015, is the younger brother of senior starting safety **Kenny Keys**. The younger Keys will have two seasons of eligibility remaining when he returns in 2017. Also, sophomore **Brandon Presley** was injured in the season opener and has not returned, and R-FR **Darren Woods Jr.** suffered a season-ending injury against Fresno State ... UNLV has either led or trailed by a touchdown or less during the fourth quarter in 15 of 21 games under head coach **Tony Sanchez** ... all 35 of his extra points this fall and is now 8 of 9 on three-pointers ... Facing third-and-11 against Fresno State on Oct. 1, QB **Dalton Sneed** ran for a 91-yard touchdown that marked the longest offensive play from scrimmage in UNLV history. The previous longest rush was 89 yards by **Darin Brightmon** vs. New Mexico State in 1989. The longest pass play in Rebel history is 87 yards in 1977. The Sneed run also set a Sam Boyd Stadium record, which includes all UNLV games plus 24 Las Vegas Bowls and a trio of WAC Championship games ... Senior RB **David Greene**, who was voted one of four team captains this fall, came into the season with zero career touchdowns but after finding the end zone again vs. CSU, he now has six in 2016, which ranks second on the team ... LB **Tau Lotulelei** finished with 12 total tackles at SJSU which moved the senior from 12th all the way into eighth place on UNLV's career tackles list ... At SJSU, **Devonte Boyd** recorded his 10th career 100-yard receiving game, which is the third most in UNLV history and just two short of the school record of 12 set by **Ryan Wolfe** from 2006-09 ... **Charles Williams** finished with 141 net rushing yards on a career-high 22 carries at SJSU. The freshman also became the third Rebel in 2016 to have a rush go at least 75 yards as he sprinted for a 75-yard score ... Against Idaho, **Johnny Stanton** became the seventh quarterback in UNLV history to rush for more than 100 net yards in a game. Just one week later, **Dalton Sneed** (pictured, left) gave UNLV its first back-to-back 100-yard rushing games by quarterbacks when he went for 147 vs. Fresno State. Sneed's total ranks second in UNLV history, trailing only **Hunkie Cooper's** 165 yards vs. Oregon State in 1991.

REBELS DOWN TIGERS IN SEASON OPENER

LAS VEGAS (AP) - Johnny Stanton was 10 of 12 for 217 yards and he threw three touchdown passes to Devonte Boyd to help UNLV beat Jackson State 63-13 on Thursday night.

It was the Rebels' first season-opening victory since 2009 when they beat Sacramento State.

On the third play from scrimmage, Boyd caught a pass over the middle and raced for a 56-yard touchdown. After Troy Hawthorne intercepted LaMontiez Ivy's pass on Jackson State's first offensive play, UNLV needed just two plays for Boyd to score from 32 yards out.

Jackson State answered with a 75-yard drive ending in a TD to pull to 14-7. But UNLV scored the next 28 points, including senior David Greene's first career TD, for a 42-10 lead at halftime.

The UNLV defense shined in the second half as the Rebels turned two turnovers in the third quarter into points. The first came when Nick Dehdashtian returned a fumble 28 yards for a touchdown. The second came just over a minute later when Torry McTyler recorded an interception and returned it 43 yards for a score.

Charles Williams ran for 96 yards and one touchdown, and Lexington Thomas added 68 yards and two TDs for UNLV (1-0). Boyd finished with 135 yards receiving.

Ivy threw for 134 yards with one touchdown and one interception for Jackson State (0-1).

REBEL NOTES

- Jackson State came to Las Vegas for only the second time and for the first time in 41 years in what was the season opener for both schools. It tied for the longest time between UNLV playing an opponent in school history as the Rebels also went 41 years between playing Southern Utah (1970 and 2011).
- With the 63-13 victory, UNLV opened the season 1-0 for the first time since 2009 and improved to 4-0 all-time vs. teams from the Southwestern Athletic Conference. The Rebels also upped their record in home-openers to 30-19.
- The 63 points tied for the fourth-most in school history and the 50-point margin of victory was the sixth biggest ever for the Rebels. Also, UNLV improved to 10-7 all-time in games played on Thursday.
- UNLV received the kickoff and scored a touchdown. It marked the eighth time in the Rebels' 13 games under Tony Sanchez that they scored on the opening drive of the game.
- On the third play from scrimmage, new UNLV quarterback Johnny Stanton hit junior WR Devonte Boyd for a 56-yard touchdown play.
- On JSU's first play from scrimmage, UNLV safety Troy Hawthorne hauled in his second career interception.
- Two plays later, Stanton found Boyd again, this time from 32 yards out, which meant that two of Stanton's first three pass attempts on the Division One level went for touchdowns. Stanton, a former Nebraska transfer who came to UNLV from junior college this season, became the 10th different Rebel to start a season opener at quarterback in the last 13 years. He finished his UNLV debut completing 10-12 for 217 yards and three scores.
- Sophomore RB Lexington Thomas, making his first career start, scored the next two touchdowns for the Rebels as he went 17 yards for the score and then rushed three yards into the end zone on consecutive drives before the end of the first quarter.
- UNLV senior running back David Greene, who was voted one of four team captains, scored his first career touchdown as a Rebel in the second quarter on a one-yard plunge. He would finish with 30 yards on six attempts.
- Stanton soon found Boyd for a 30-yard score in the second quarter to mark the 13th time in history that a Rebel caught at least three TDs in a game. It was the first time for Boyd and the first time for a Rebel since Kendal Keys did it at Colorado State just last year.

BRUINS PULL AWAY FROM REBELS IN FINAL STANZA

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) - Josh Rosen threw one touchdown and ran for another, Soso Jamabo rushed for three touchdowns and UCLA held off UNLV 42-21 on Saturday.

Rosen had 267 yards passing, Jamabo rushed for 90 yards as the Bruins (1-1) and Brandon Stephens added 71 yards rushing.

Fabian Moreau intercepted passes by the Rebels' Johnny Stanton twice, taking the first back 52 yards to set up a short touchdown run by

Jamabo.

Stanton had 153 yards passing for UNLV (1-1), which fell to 4-16 all-time against Pac-12 teams. Devonte Boyd had five receptions for 84 yards. Lexington Thomas added 112 yards rushing and one touchdown.

Stanton found Mekhi Stevenson for a 14-yard touchdown pass late in the first half and scored on an 11-yard run in the third quarter to cut the deficit to 28-21, but UCLA responded with touchdown runs from Bolu Olorunfunmi and Rosen in the fourth quarter to pull away. A targeting penalty against safety Kenny Keys extended the UCLA drive that pushed the lead back to 14 points.

- UNLV played at UCLA for the first time and appeared in the Los Angeles area for the first time since taking on USC in 1997.
- The Rebels wore silver helmets, white jerseys and black pants in the game. It was the second time in history that combination had been used for the program (lost at Fresno State in 2015).
- UNLV took to the opening kickoff but went three-and-out, which marked only the sixth time in 14 games under head coach Tony Sanchez that the Rebels did NOT score a touchdown on their first offensive series of the game.
- Devonte Boyd caught a 16-yarder in UNLV's second drive, which meant that the junior has caught at least one pass in all 27 games of his collegiate career.
- UNLV posted a 70-yard scoring drive on its second possession that culminated with a 12-yard touchdown run by Lexington Thomas. That marked the sophomore's third touchdown of the season and the sixth of his young career.
- With UNLV driving, quarterback Johnny Stanton threw the team's first interception of the season in the second quarter, which set up a 21-yard scoring drive for the Bruins.
- Stanton threw his fourth touchdown pass of the season to close out the second quarter scoring as he hit true freshman Mekhi Stevenson from 14 yards out. It was the second career reception and first touchdown for Stevenson.
- Stanton put in his first UNLV rushing touchdown with an 11-yard scamper in the third quarter that drew the Rebels to within seven, 28-21.
- Thomas, a sophomore, posted his fourth career 100-yard rushing game in what was only his second career start.

REBELS UNABLE TO KEEP UP WITH CHIPPEWAS

MOUNT PLEASANT, Mich. - UNLV traveled to the Great Lakes State for the second time in consecutive years, looking for its first victory in the Eastern Time Zone. The Rebels put up a valiant effort early, but eventually fell to Central Michigan 44-21.

UNLV was the first team to get on the board after Rebel walk-on **Aaron Borg** made a huge play in his first game at UNLV. Borg blocked a Chippewa punt and freshman running back **Charles Williams** jumped on

the loose ball in the endzone to give the Rebels a 7-0 lead.

Central Michigan tied the game later in the first quarter when **Cooper Rush** hooked up with senior **Jesse Kroll** for a 30-yard score. It was the first of six touchdowns Rush would throw for on the day.

CMU took the lead late in the quarter when the Chips marched down the field and Rush found **Mark Chapman** for a 13-yard touchdown.

Early in the second quarter, UNLV shifted the momentum of the game when **Lexington Thomas** rumbled 85 yards for a touchdown to tie the game. It was the first 80 plus yard run since 2011 and the fourth longest rush ever in program history.

The Rebels again took the lead midway through the second quarter when they marched down the field and Johnny Stanton found **Darren Woods Jr.** for a 13-yard score. It would be the last time the Rebels would find the end zone in the game.

Central Michigan responded by scoring two touchdowns late in the second quarter. Rush hooked up with Chapman for the second time in the game for a 29-yard touchdown with 5:07 left in the half. With 1:35 left in the first half Rush found **Corey Willis** for a 26-yard score, giving the Chippewas a 28-21 halftime lead.

CMU kept it rolling in the third quarter when Rush and Willis hooked up again, this time for a 31-yard TD.

Central Michigan's **Winslow Chapman** then blocked a UNLV punt and the ball went out back of the end zone, giving the Chippewas a safety. It was the first safety UNLV allowed under the **Tony Sanchez** era.

The Chippewas concluded the scoring early in the fourth quarter when Rush found **Brandon Childress** for a 42-yard touchdown. Rush finished the game 20-of-33 for 352 yards. His six touchdowns set a Kelly/Shorts Stadium record and the game marks the second consecutive game in which he has thrown four or more touchdowns.

UNLV's Stanton finished 15-of-41 for 131 yards and one touchdown to go with two interceptions. His top target was true freshman **Mekhi Stevenson**, who finished with five catches for 48 yards. Woods Jr. finished the game with three catches for 38 yards.

On the ground, Thomas led the way, rushing for 113 yards and one score. It was the second consecutive game in which Thomas has eclipsed the 100-yard mark. Through three games, he has rushed for 293 yards on 47 attempts.

On the defensive side of the ball, **Troy Hawthorne** led the Rebels with 10 tackles. **Darius Mouton** made two pass breakups, while **LaKeith Walls** forced a fumble that **Ryan McAleenan** recovered.

UNLV RUSHING ATTACK NOT ENOUGH IN OT LOSS TO IDAHO

LAS VEGAS - UNLV rushed for 394 yards, but it was not enough as the Rebels suffered a 33-30 overtime loss to Idaho on Saturday at Sam Boyd Stadium.

Sophomore running back Lexington Thomas rushed 19 times for 160 yards with two touchdowns. The performance marked the sixth time Thomas rushed for more than 100 yards in his UNLV career (third time this season).

Quarterback Johnny Stanton also eclipsed the 100-yard rushing mark, running for 131 yards on 18 carries. It was Stanton's first 100-yard rushing game of his UNLV career. He also completed 14 of 26 passes for 175 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions.

The game marked the first time UNLV (1-3) had a pair of 100-yard rushers in a single game since last season's game against Hawaii. It also signaled the third time that a Tony Sanchez-led team has had two ball carriers rush for more than a 100 yards.

Idaho (2-2) jumped out to an early 10-0 lead before Thomas put the Rebels on the board with a three-yard touchdown run midway through the second quarter. The Vandals added a touchdown late in the second quarter, and UNLV answered when Stanton found Marc Philippi for a four-yard touchdown pass to enter the locker room trailing 17-14.

Idaho added a field goal on its first drive of the second half, extending the lead to 20-14. UNLV tied the game following a pair of Evan Pantels field goals - Pantels' first two field goals of the season.

After Idaho reclaimed the lead with a touchdown with 6:14 left in regulation, the Rebels responded with a three-play, 83-yard drive, capped off by a 55-yard touchdown run by Thomas.

The Rebels received the ball first in the extra period, which drive ended with a 23-yard Pantels field goal. Idaho followed up by scoring the game-sealing touchdown on the ensuing possession.

The Rebels racked up a season-high 539 yards of offense. Devonte Boyd hauled in six passes for 64 yards, while Tau Lotulelei led the way with 15 tackles (5 solo).

REBEL NOTES

- UNLV hosted Idaho for the first time since 2005. With the 33-30 overtime victory, the Vandals improved to 4-3 all-time against the Rebels, including taking two straight.
- The Rebels fell to 4-10 all-time in overtime games.
- Idaho's Kaden Elliss intercepted a Johnny Stanton pass and returned it for a 31-yard touchdown to open the scoring. It marked the first pick-six against the Rebels since Kenny Young of UCLA did it on Sept. 12, 2015.
- UNLV got on the board in the second quarter when sophomore Lexington Thomas rushed it in from three yards out. In the fourth quarter he sprinted 55 yards for another TD to give him six on the season and nine in his career. It was his second multi-touchdown game in the first four dates of the season (two vs. Jackson State).
- Just before halftime, Stanton hit fullback Marc Philippi for a four-yard touchdown pass. It was the first career score for the senior from Las Vegas.
- Thomas posted his third 100-yard rushing game of the season with a career-high 160 yards on 19 carries. It was the sixth century-mark effort in the first 16 games of his young career and the total of six already ties him for 13th in school history.
- UNLV has now either led or trailed by a touchdown or less during the fourth quarter in 12 of 16 games under head coach Tony Sanchez.
- UNLV made all three field goals attempted vs. Idaho after not having attempted any during the first three games.

SNEED SHINES IN UNLV VICTORY OVER BULLDOGS

LAS VEGAS - Freshman quarterback **Dalton Sneed** impressed in his first career start, rushing for 147 yards on 15 carries with one touchdown to lead UNLV to a 45-20 homecoming game victory over Fresno State on Saturday at Sam Boyd Stadium to snap a three-game losing streak.

"It's been a tough couple of weeks," UNLV head coach **Tony Sanchez** said. "It's great to see them be able to celebrate all the hard work they put in."

The Rebels (2-3, 1-0 Mountain West) rushed for 364

yards as a team and featured two 100-yard rushers for the second consecutive week. Freshman running back **Charles Williams** notched his first career 100-yard rushing game, gaining 153 yards on 18 carries with one touchdown to complement Sneed's 147-yard rushing performance.

"We've got a lot of young guys doing special things," Sanchez said.

The Rebels got on the scoreboard first when sophomore running back **Lexington Thomas** scored on a one-yard touchdown run. The Bulldogs (1-4, 0-1 Mountain West) leveled the game on the next possession.

Williams scored his lone touchdown of the game, rushing five yards to put UNLV ahead 14-7. The Rebels extended their lead after Sneed found a wide-open **Elijah Trosclair** for a 61-yard touchdown pass -- the first for both players.

Fresno State cut the lead to 21-10 after a 42-yard field goal. On the ensuing drive, Sneed set a new UNLV record by avoiding a safety and scampering 91 yards for a score.

The play was the longest scoring play in school history.

"As soon as I saw that black paint in the end zone, I thought, 'I need to get out and get to the sideline,'" Sneed said. "I got out and got a few good blocks and just turned on the jets and got six."

UNLV added a field goal late in the third quarter, extending its lead to 31-10. The Bulldogs scored the next 10 point, cutting the Rebel lead to 11. The Rebels closed out the game with a pair of **David Greene** touchdowns.

Sneed also threw for 129 yards on 8-of-16 passing with one touchdown.

The Rebels accumulated 493 yards of offense. Senior linebacker **Tau Lotulelei** led the way with 10 tackles (six solo) and one sack, while fellow senior **Ryan McAlenean** added eight (four solo).

REBEL NOTES

- UNLV's 45-20 victory over Fresno State was its largest win over a Mountain West opponent since downing San Diego State 45-19 on Nov. 30, 2013. The Rebels have now defeated the Bulldogs in back-to-back home dates for the first time in a series that dates to 1979.
- The Rebels won their MW opener at home for just the third time since the league started in 1999.
- UNLV improved to 2-0 in MW openers under Tony Sanchez and improved to 5-13 overall in such games.
- The Rebels improved to 26-23 in Homecoming games.
- UNLV has now led or trailed by a touchdown or less during the fourth quarter in 13 of 17 career games under Sanchez.
- Because of an injury to four-game starter Johnny Stanton, redshirt freshman Dalton Sneed made his first collegiate start at quarterback. He had seen limited action in two games this season, including completing his one pass attempt for six yards in the season opener vs. Jackson State. Sneed finished with 129 yards passing on 8 of 16 attempts with zero turnovers.
- Facing third-and-11, Sneed ran for a 91-yard touchdown that marked the longest play from scrimmage in UNLV history. The previous longest rush was 89 yards by Darin Brightmon vs. New Mexico State in 1989. The longest pass play in Rebel history is 87 yards in 1977.
- The Sneed run also set a Sam Boyd Stadium record, which includes all UNLV games plus 24 Las Vegas Bowls and WAC Championship games.

Pumphrey scored from 9 yards, splitting a pair of defenders with a cutback move to give the Aztecs (4-1, 1-0) a 20-7 lead with 4:50 left in the third quarter.

The Rebels lone score came in the second quarter when **Jeremiah Valoaga** sacked SDSU's quarterback and forced a fumble. **Dominic Baldwin** picked up the loose ball and returned it 20 yards for a touchdown.

REBELS WIN WILD AFFAIR ON ISLANDS

HONOLULU (UNLVRebels.com) – Sophomore defensive back **Darius Mouton** recovered a fumble with less than five minutes remaining, leading to the eventual game-winning field goal in UNLV's 41-38 victory over Hawaii on Saturday at Aloha Stadium in Honolulu, Hawaii.

The win marked UNLV's first win on the islands since 2000.

Redshirt freshman quarterback **Dalton Sneed** threw for a career-best 279 yards on 19-of-27 passing with two

touchdowns. He also rushed for 61 yards on 11 carries.

Running back **Lexington Thomas** logged another 100-yard performance for the Rebels (3-4, 2-1 Mountain West), rushing for 102 yards on 21 carries with a touchdown. Thomas also caught two passes for 43 yards with a touchdown.

Running back **David Greene** punched in a pair of touchdowns, while wide receiver **Devonte Boyd** moved up the all-time UNLV receptions list with a six-catch, 83-yard showing. Boyd also caught one of Sneed's touchdown passes.

UNLV logged 535 total yards of offense in the high-scoring affair.

The Rebels jumped out to an early 7-0 lead when Sneed found Boyd for a two-yard touchdown pass with 3:37 left in the first quarter. The Rainbow Warriors (3-4, 2-1) answered with a touchdown of their own before taking a 14-7 lead with 10:26 left in the second quarter.

UNLV tied the game when Sneed found Thomas for a 37-yard touchdown pass with 6:07 left in the first half. Hawaii reclaimed the lead following a short touchdown run, but the Rebels knotted the game at 21 before halftime after Greene scored the first of his two touchdowns.

The Rebels grabbed their second lead of the night following an **Evan Pantels** 18-yard field goal early in the third quarter. The Rainbow Warriors scored the next 10 points to take a seven-point lead before Greene rushed in his second touchdown of the night to level the game at 31 early in the fourth quarter.

Hawaii took a 38-31 lead with 9:02 left in the game. UNLV responded on the ensuing drive, marching 80 yards on 10 plays to tie the game again following a Thomas 34-yard touchdown run.

UNLV's defense came up big on the next drive when senior linebacker **Tau Lotulelei** forced a fumble, which Mouton recovered, setting the stage for UNLV's game-clinching field goal.

REBEL NOTES

- Before Saturday's win, UNLV's last victory at Hawai'i came in 2000 under head coach John Robinson
- The Rebels broke a four-game losing skid on the islands and only won at Hawai'i for the third time in 13 all-time trips
- Jeremiah Valoaga sacked Warrior QB Dru Brown for a loss of 19 yards on the opening drive of the game, which forced a UH punt. It was the second sack of the season for the senior.
- Dalton Sneed hit Devonte Boyd for a two-yard touchdown to open the scoring. It was the 15th career score for Boyd, which moved him into a tie for 11th with Keenan McCardell (1987-90) and Ryan Wolfe (2005-09) on the school's all-time list
- After UH took a 14-7 lead, UNLV tied the game with a 37-yard touchdown scored by Lexington Thomas on a shovel pass from Sneed. It went down as the first receiving pass of the season for Thomas who added a rushing score later in the game to give him a team-leading ninth TD overall in 2016
- Devonte Boyd's six receptions vs. UH moved him from 13th all the way to alone in 11th place on the UNLV career catch list with 145. Next up is Michael Morton in 10th place with 155 from 1978-81
- Boyd finished with 83 yards, which moved him past Phillip Payne (2008-11) into ninth place on the school's career list with 2,305
- The win snapped UNLV's six-game road losing streak

UNLV CAN NOT OVERCOME EARLY DEFICIT IN LOSS TO RAMS

LAS VEGAS (UNLVRebels.com) – UNLV dug itself a big hole in the first half, which it was unable to dig out of in a 42-23 loss to Colorado State on Saturday at Sam Boyd Stadium.

The Rams (4-4, 2-2 Mountain West) scored 35 points in the first half and held the ball for nearly 21 minutes. Colorado State converted 80 percent (8-of-10) on third down in the first half, forcing the Rebels to stay on the field longer. The UNLV offense also struggled, managing only 72 yards of offense in the

first 30 minutes.

UNLV quarterback **Dalton Sneed** struggled throwing the ball, completing 7-of-23 passes for 185 yards with two touchdowns and one interception for the Rebels (3-5, 2-2). Sneed, however, was effective on the ground, compiling 96 yards on 15 carries.

Sneed engineered a five-play, 75-yard drive capped off by a **Lexington Thomas** 37-yard touchdown reception. On the ensuing Colorado State drive, **Darius Mouton** forced a fumble, which UNLV recovered. The turnover led to an **Evan Pantels** 27-yard field goal to cut the Rams lead to 25.

The next three possessions resulted in punts, but the Rebels closed the gap to 18 after **David Greene** finished a 12-play, 88-yard drive.

UNLV added its final score of the game after Sneed found **Mekhi Stevenson** for a 51-yard touchdown pass.

Devonte Boyd caught three passes for 62 yards, while **Charles Williams** rushed for 41 yards.

Troy Hawthorne led the way with 12 tackles and a forced fumble. **Tau Lotulelei** registered 11 tackles (seven solo), while **Kenny Keys** made 10 tackles with a pair of pass breakups.

- Colorado State's 42-23 victory broke UNLV's two-game home winning streak against the Rams
- 731 student musicians from grades 6-12 in Clark County Schools gathered on the Sam Boyd Stadium field before kickoff to break the World Record for Largest Mariachi Performance. The previous record was 700 set in Mexico
- True freshman Charles Williams earned his first career start at tailback as regular starter Lexington Thomas also started but lined up in the slot
- UNLV legendary quarterback/punter Randall Cunningham was honored on the field after the first quarter by the National Football Foundation for being selected for the College Football Hall of Fame. He will be inducted in New York City on December 6
- UNLV PK Evan Pantels missed his first kick of the season on the opening drive when his field goal attempt went wide right. The JC transfer had been good on all six of his field goal attempts and all of his extra point attempts this fall. He came back to make his next attempt, from 27 yards out
- Quarterback Dalton Sneed was credited with a lost fumble in the second quarter when he threw a backward pass that was not corralled by running back Lexington Thomas. It was only the second lost fumble of the season for the Rebels
- Sneed threw a 37-yard touchdown to Thomas to get the Rebels on the board in the third quarter. It marked Thomas' second receiving score of the season and team-leading 10th overall touchdown (13th in his career)
- David Greene ran one in from two yards to give him six rushing touchdowns on the season after coming into his senior year with zero scores
- Sneed found Mekhi Stevenson for a 51-yard touchdown to end the scoring. It was the freshman's longest career catch and his second score of the season

San Jose State took control of the contest shortly after, scoring the next 21 points to take a 24-7 lead. UNLV's **Evan Pantels** cut into the lead with a 37-yard field, but the Spartans added another field goal to enter the half up 27-10.

The Spartans kicked their third field goal of the night to start the second half, pushing their lead to 30-10.

The Rebels offense came to life in the later part of the third quarter, when Palandech found Andrew Price for a 2-yard touchdown pass.

UNLV got within one score deep in the fourth quarter, when Palandech ran 16 yards to cut the lead down to six (30-24).

The Rebels got one last opportunity to take the lead, but the rally came to an end when Palandech threw his lone interception of the game.

- Boyd recorded his 10th career 100-yard receiving game, which is the third-most in UNLV history and just two short of the school record of 12 set by Ryan Wolfe from 2006-09.
- Charles Williams finished with 141 net rushing yards on a career-high 22 carries. The freshman also became the third Rebel in 2016 to have a rush go at least 75 yards as he sprinted for a 75-yard score.
- Freshman QB Dalton Sneed started the game but was soon replaced by junior Kurt Palandech, who saw his most action of the season and completed 10 of 21 attempts for 161 yards.
- Two UNLV QBs were sacked a combined three times by the SJSU defense, which nearly doubled the amount of sacks allowed by the Rebels coming in (four in first eight games).
- UNLV's defense posted a season-best four QB sacks, including two by senior Jeremiah Valoaga.
- Tau Lotulelei's 12 total tackles moved the senior linebacker into the top 10 all-time at the school with 285.
- Three UNLV assistants formerly coached at SJSU: DC Kent Baer, S Andy LaRussa and CB J.D. Williams
