TENTH ANNUAL COLLEGE BASKETBALL INVITATIONAL presented by FIVE FOUR

The 10th annual CBI presented by FIVE FOUR tips off with seven First Round games on March 15 and the final one on March 16. The Quarterfinals commence on Monday, March 20, followed by Semifinal Round action on Wednesday, March 22.

The unique quality of the CBI presented by FIVE FOUR is its best-of-three Finals, which will be held March 27, March 29, and March 31. One team will host two games should a third game be necessary.

University of Nevada - 2016 CBI Champions

In 2016, 14 games were decided by less than 10 points, with an average margin of victory of 7.3 ppg. Ten games were decided by five points or less. Over the last two CBIs, 27 games have been decided by 10 points or less.

DID YOU KNOW...

Seven of the nine CBI Finals have gone the distance as Tulsa (2008), Oregon State (2009), Oregon (2011), Pittsburgh (2012), Santa Clara (2013), Siena (2014), and Nevada (2016) won in three games. In 2010, VCU became the first team to need two games to win the CBI crown. Loyola Chicago also accomplished that feat in 2015.

Samples of CBI Success

- After winning the 2016 CBI in head coach Eric Musselman's first season, Nevada won a school record 14 Mountain West Conference games en route to the regular season and tournament championships.
- Vermont reached the semifinals of the 2016 CBI and then posted a 16-0 record in America East Conference play and won the 2017 American East regular season and tournament titles.
- In 2016, UNCG made its first postseason appearance since 2001 and followed that by winning the 2017 Southern Conference regular season championship.
- Texas A&M returned seven players from the the 2014 CBI, advanced to the 2015 NIT and were ranked as high as fifth during the 2015-16 season.
- Stony Brook played in the 2014 and 2015 CBI and then earned its first NCAA bid in 2016, while Colorado also played in the 2015 CBI and received a 2016 NCAA bid.
- Wyoming went 25-9 and won the Mountain West championship to earn its first NCAA bid since 2002, Hampton won the MEAC title for the first time since 2011, and South Dakota State won the Summit League's regular season crown after participating in the 2014 CBI.
- North Dakota State and Western Michigan both won their respective league regular season and tournament championships and Tulsa won its postseason tournament after playing in the 2013 CBI.
- Texas parlayed its 2013 CBI experience into a No. 7 seed in the 2014 NCAA Tournament. The Longhorns were ranked as high as No. 15 in 2014.
- Pittsburgh won the 2012 CBI and earned a No. 8 seed in the 2013 NCAA Tournament.
- After advancing to consecutive NCAA championship games, Butler played in the 2012 CBI, advancing to the semifinals. They followed that with a No. 6 seed in the 2013 NCAA Tournament.
- In 2012, Creighton, Davidson, Montana, and St. Bonaventure all won their respective league tournaments after playing in the 2011 CBI.
- **VCU won the 2010 CBI and advanced to the Final Four the next season.**
- Creighton advanced to the Championship Series of the 2011 CBI and in 2012 was ranked as high as 13th.
- Oregon won the 2011 CBI and went 24-10 the following season, surpassing the previous season's win total, which included five CBI wins.
- Morehead State played in the 2010 CBI and the next year had, arguably, the greatest season in school history.
- Saint Louis advanced to the final of the 2010 CBI with a team featuring seven freshmen. Those freshmen headlined the 2013 Atlantic 10 regular season and tournament champions, earning a No. 4 seed in the 2013 NCAA Tournament.
- Richmond advanced to the semifinals of the 2009 CBI and went on to earn back-to-back NCAA Tournament bids for the first time in 19 years.
- UTEP reached the Championship Series of the 2009 CBI and went on to advance to the 2010 NCAA Tournament and win 51 games the next two seasons.
- Tulsa won the 2008 CBI prior to winning 48 games the next two years.
- Utah played in the 2008 CBI and went on to win 24 games the next season and reach the NCAA Tournament for the first time in four years.

It Happened in the CBI

- By winning the 2016 CBI, Nevada earned the first-ever postseason basketball title in Mountain West Conference history.
- Loyola Chicago's 2015 CBI bid marked the Ramblers' first postseason appearance since advancing to the Sweet 16 of the 1985 NCAA Tournament. Seattle's berth was its first Division I postseason bid since 1969.
- Siena earned its first-ever postseason championship in winning the 2014 CBI. The Saints moved to Division I in 1976-77.
- By advancing to the Championship Series of the 2014 CBI, Fresno State reached the championship of a postseason tournament for just the second time in school history (1983).
- Bryant made its first-ever postseason appearance when it hosted Richmond in the First Round of the 2013 CBI.
- In back-to-back games in the 2012 CBI, Oregon State posted the two highest field goal percentages in CBI history. In the First Round against Western Illinois, the Beavers set the record by shooting 30-46 (.652) from the field. The next game against TCU in the Quarterfinals, OSU shot 39-60 (.650) from the field - the second-best effort in tournament history.
- On March 14, 2012, Western Illinois played in its first-ever postseason game.
- On March 13, 2012, Princeton scored 95 points in a 95-86 win at Evansville in the First Round of the CBI. It was the most points scored in regulation by the Tigers since 1995.
- On March 16, 2011, UCF beat St. Bonaventure, 69-54, for the school's first-ever postseason win. UCF would go on to advance to the semifinals of the CBI that season.
- On March 16, 2011, Rhode Island beat Miami (Ohio), 76-59, in the First Round of the CBI. The win was the 90th for the Rams' senior class of Marquis Jones, Will Martell, Delroy James, and Ben Eaves, tying them as the winningest four-year class in school history.
- On March 16, 2011, Rhode Island's Delroy James posted the first triple-double in school history with his 22-point, 11-rebound, and 10-assist effort in a 76-59 win over Miami (Ohio).
- On March 15, 2011, Hofstra's Charles Jenkins scored his 2,500th career point in the First Round of the CBI - his final game as a member of the Pride. Jenkins ended his career as Hofstra's all-time leading scorer with 2,513 points.
- On March 31, 2010, VCU became the first team in CBI history to win the Championship Series in two games, taking a 71-65 win at Saint Louis. The next season the Rams would become the first CBI champion to play in the NCAA Final Four.
- On April 3, 2009, Oregon State beat UTEP to capture the first-ever postseason championship in school history as the Beavers earned the CBI title with an 81-73 win in El Paso.

THAT'S A FACT

In the previous nine CBI Finals, the team that won the first game went on to win the series six times. The two times the game one winner lost the series were in 2011 and 2012 when Creighton opened with a victory against Oregon (2011) and Washington State beat Pittsburgh in its opener (2012).

CONFERENCE CALL

The 2016 CBI presented by FIVE FOUR includes teams from 12 different conferences: America East (2), Atlantic 10 (1), Big Sky (3), Metro Atlantic Athletic (1), Mid-American (1), Mountain West (1), Ohio Valley (1), Southern (2), Southland (1), Summit (1), West Coast Conference (1), Western Athletic Conference (1).

FANTASTIC

518,041 fans have attended games at the nine eight CBIs. In 2011, Creighton set a tournament record with a crowd of 12,381 in its Championship Series home game.

RULES ARE RULES

The CBI presented by FIVE FOUR, which is celebrating its 10th anniversary, in an effort to assist the NCAA in its research in exploring the implementation of four 10-minute quarters rather than two 20-minute halves and increased scoring options, will utilize recent experimental playing rules adopted by the 2017 NIT, including resetting team fouls to zero at the end of 10-minute segments of each half and resetting the shot clock to 20 seconds instead of 30 seconds at times when the ball is inbounded in the front court.

In the experimental rule regarding resetting the team fouls, the one-and-one free throw bonus will not occur. Instead, teams will shoot two free throws in the following examples:

- Each team is limited to a team total of four personal and technical fouls (excluding administrative technical fouls) during each 10-minute segment of each half.
- The first 10-minute segment of each half will begin when the ball becomes live to begin the half and will end when the game clock reads 10:00. The second segment will begin when the game clock reads 9:59 and ends when the half ends.
- When a team has reached the four-foul limitation, all subsequent personal and technical fouls (excluding administrative technical fouls) will be penalized by two free throw attempts.
- Each team's foul total will reset to zero when any 10-minute segment has ended.
- The rules regarding penalties for fouls in the act of shooting, flagrant fouls or technical fouls will not be affected by this experimental rule and will always result in two free throws unless the rules specifically say otherwise.
- In any overtime period, when a team has reached a total of three personal and technical fouls (excluding administrative technical fouls), all subsequent personal and technical fouls will be penalized by two free throw attempts.

In the other experimental rule, the shot clock will remain the same as when play was interrupted or reset to 20 seconds, whichever is greater, at any time any of the following occurs:

- A personal foul by the defense, which results in no free throws, and the ball is inbounded in the front court.
- Any technical foul assessed against the defense, and the ball is inbounded in the front court.
- The game is stopped for a bleeding player or blood on a uniform and the ball is inbounded in the front court.

What They're Saying

Eric Musselman, Nevada (2016)

Before we even played a game in the CBI, what we did was we talked about what coach Rodney Terry had done with this Fresno State team (advancing to the 2014 CBI finals and winning the 2016 Mountain West Conference title). We used that to try to get our guys a little bit energized. Our players were disappointed that we weren't able to make the NCAA Tournament and then, realistically, we came up a little bit short, obviously, for the NIT... We had to get our guys motivated. We also talked about VCU propelling themselves into a Final Four after winning the CBI. So there are a lot of great examples for how teams can use this to kick start. Without a question, Fresno State and what Coach Terry has done is something that springboarded our attitudes going into this.

Eric Musselman, Nevada (2016)

The thing I will always remember about this is the celebration afterward and the smiles on the guys' faces.

Tyron Criswell, Nevada senior (2016)

This is just the best way to finish it out here at Nevada for me. I'm so happy. I can't even say.

Marqueze Coleman, Nevada senior (2016)

It's an amazing feeling. It's been a long journey but it's also been a good one. I've been through so much adversity in my career and this teaches me that you can overcome adversity. You just have to stay strong and you can achieve great things. Winning this is going to be a lifelong memory for me.

Jack Rieger, Nevada Sagebrush (2016)

When the final whistle blew at 8:28 p.m., the Wolf Pack's players and coaches embraced one another and sprinted to the student section side of the court in pure elation. Elijah Foster, Cameron Oliver and others stood on the media table and opened their arms to the home fans, who had grown to adore their team with every passing week. First-year coach Eric Musselman was mobbed by the student section as chants of "Muss" echoed throughout Lawlor Events Center. The scene was taken directly from a Hollywood script, as players and coaches took their turn cutting down the nets.

Jack Rieger, Nevada Sagebrush (2016)

There's reason to believe winning the CBI could foreshadow bigger things. In 2010, VCU won the CBI and the next year was in the final four. In 2011, Oregon won the CBI and went 24-10 the following year in a really tough Pac-12 Conference. In 2012, Pittsburgh took home the CBI trophy and finished 2013 as the 20th-best team in the country.

Jimmy Patsos, Siena (2016)

There's always going to be somebody on the other team who wants to play at this level and that's why the CBI is a great tournament. That's why some of those big schools who didn't come, I think some of them are making mistakes because some of them haven't been to the NCAA in 30 years. What do they think they are going to do, magic carpet ride it there?... You should go to the CBI and try to win a few games. And then maybe the NIT before you get fired. "But I just want to go to the NCAA or bust" I don't believe in that and I'm really appreciative to Siena and the CBI... But some of those big schools who didn't feel like playing, instead of whining and staying at home, come out and play basketball.

Sean Woods, Morehead State (2016)

What a championship tournament atmosphere. I'm just tickled to death that our fans came out like they did and really got behind this team with great enthusiasm and geared us through. This was a total team effort by everybody from Morehead. It's just so refreshing to end the year at home with a win in this type of atmosphere here at Morehead State.

Wes Miller, UNCG (2016)

This is our program's first taste of postseason basketball in a long time and we are still learning how to handle late game situations and the emotions that go with it in postseason play. This was a great experience for our guys and our program. This experience (CBI) will help our young team next year and beyond.

R.J. White, UNCG junior (2016)

When Coach called, he asked if I had touched a basketball since spring break started. I lied and told him I did. I was just so excited to get another chance to play.

On hosting CBI games:
It's been beneficial on a number of levels. It's been good for the student-athlete to be able to stay at home, not have to travel, sleep in their own beds, go to class. From a fan's perspective, it's several more opportunities to see their team. On both levels, it's been a tremendous success.

Cameron Dollar, Seattle (2016)

You wonder if you can match the experience that you had last year. The first time you do it is usually ... the experience that you're never able to duplicate. But it was a great experience. The crowd was great. The energy was great. I loved seeing the bounce in our kids' step and their eyes as they're playing. We couldn't even hear each other because of how loud it was.

Brian Wickstrom, ULM athletic director (2015)

I was at UTEP and we played the first year (of the CBI) and lost. Then the second year we played in it and we made it to the championship against Oregon State. We had such a young team those two years. The next year we made the NCAA Tournament. With the team we have here, this is a great experience. All the extra practices and extra games our kids are getting to play, this is what this tournament is about. College basketball is an unbelievable experience for these kids and in an environment like this, it's outstanding.

Steve Watson, Loyola Chicago athletic director (2015)

A lot of teams might not have been too excited to play in this tournament, but our kids have bought in. When was the last time you saw this gym this excited?

Porter Moser, Loyola Chicago (2015)

Anytime you can keep playing, keep practicing in March, experience that "win or go home" feeling, it's a positive. I have not had that "Here we go again" feeling one time this season. These guys expect to win. That's another sign that the culture is changing.

Xavier Johnson, Colorado sophomore (2015)

I think it's fun. Anyone who wants to compete should be allowed to compete, and the harder they compete, the better it makes us.

Marty Wilson, Pepperdine (2015)

Our basketball team is thrilled to be competing in the CBI. It is an excellent and exciting opportunity for us to continue our season as we seek to build upon a positive basketball year.

Adam Hunsucker, The News Star (2015)

(Head coach Keith) Richard and the (ULM) Warhawks marched into the CBI following the program's best season since 2002 and rallied past Eastern Michigan 71-67 in the final minute... The win was ULM's first in the postseason since 1991... For one night, everyone inside Fant-Ewing Coliseum partied like it was the early 90s.

Patrick Chambers, Penn State (2014)

We are looking forward to the opportunity to play in the CBI. The team is grateful for [the] chance to continue practicing together and ultimately having a chance to compete for a championship.

Bob Grant, Wright State director of athletics (2013)

It's one of the best things we have ever done — absolutely. This was the crowning moment to a great season and a really great month for us. The buzz around us now is as much as the buzz was in 2007 when we made the NCAA tournament.

Steve Hawkins, Western Michigan (2013)

When you look at the field they put together for this thing (CBI), look at the teams that were in it and now out of it, the likes of Texas and Purdue, it is a very talented field and one that I thought compared favorably to the NIT, to be honest with you. To be sitting here in this situation is great for us. We're excited about it.

Rick Barnes, Texas (2013)

It may be different if we were a group of seniors and older guys. With a young group, you've gotta want to play. Every experience we could put these guys through, whether it's going on the road to play games ... we didn't do as well on the road as we have in the past.

Matt Painter, Purdue (2013)

I wanted to play. There wasn't much dialogue. I talked to our players, but you really want to play more games and get that bad taste out of your mouth. We played really well at the end of the season...

Terone Johnson, Purdue junior (2013)

We can use this tournament as a building block. For some teams that have played in the past, it definitely helped them. As young as we are, we can use it for a learning experience for next year.

Scott Nagy, South Dakota State (2012)

Obviously, you hope you make the NCAA Tournament, but if you don't, any tournament you can get into would be good. If you look at a school like VCU, two years ago it won the CBI and a year later it's in the Final Four. Any of those experiences can help. It's a huge benefit not only from the experience of being in a tournament, but you get to practice longer and you're practicing when other people aren't. For us, when we only have one senior, that's even more important.

This was the right thing to do. Overall, it will be good competition for our players... There are a lot of advantages.

It's huge, really big for us...Obviously, in the postseason, this group that we've had the last two years, if you add it up, we're (10-0) right now in the postseason.

Shaka Smart, VCU (2010)

There's a perception that tournament is not where you want to be, you want to be in the NCAA Tournament, but it was a chance to keep gaining experience. The biggest thing is we were able to go from there and have a successful year.

Jamie Skeen, VCU junior (2010)

(After winning the 2010 CBI (VCU advanced to the 2011 Final Four)
It's a momentum builder going into next year. We're losing some seniors, but it's going to give us confidence for next year. We went out this season with a bang.

Ron Hunter, IUPUI (2010)

Our guys deserve this. We absolutely deserve to be playing postseason basketball and being a part of March Madness. We were obviously disappointed that we didn't win our conference tournament, but we still wanted to be part of postseason basketball...this gives us another chance to showcase our basketball program on a larger stage.

Tim Miles, Colorado State (2010)

We're so happy the season didn't end with the San Diego State game. A lot of people go to a lot of places for spring break and we're happy to be going to Morehead State.

El Paso (Texas) Times (2009)

The crowd was alive... some sort of living, breathing entity with ear shattering, rock concert, airplane noise. It began to grow as it formed at 3 p.m. to await the chance to get into the building. It flowed down the concourse, filling up the seats like lava flowing out of a volcano. It rocked and rolled and roared.

Craig Robinson, Oregon State (2009)

First of all, it gives us some experience playing in the postseason. Secondly, it allows us to keep playing. We are one of the few teams still playing and that is terrific for the program... it is terrific for our confidence... it is a terrific overall experience. And finally, we have access to our players on a full-time basis right now which helps with player development, strategies for next year and builds our confidence level heading into the spring, when we need that extra work. We see it as all good. It's an opportunity for our guys to play in a tournament atmosphere. It's a chance to win a title. It's a way to keep playing and a young team like ours can really benefit from that.

Benji Harris, *Sam Page Sports* (2008)

The championship is a best of three series. I repeat a best of three series! This is one of the best things I have ever heard of. This is how championships are won in the NBA and I love the idea of a championship series in college hoops. This allows for these games to actually feel like basketball games. Student sections, pep bands, and elderly boosters screaming their lungs out are all things that are lost in the NCAA championship but not in the CBI championship.

Doug Wojcik, Tulsa (2008)

(After winning the 2008 CBI Championship)

This is priceless for us. The tournament... it is the best thing going. We (Tulsa and Bradley) would have both been in the NIT anyway had that not changed and this is better because we've been able to play on home courts... we've been able to capture something that myself and (athletic director) Bubba (Cunningham) could never do with a marketing plan, so it's awesome.

(On the crowd vs. Old Dominion)

I could tell no difference between the crowd today and when 15,000 people have been in here.

Coastal Carolina Chanticleers

Head Coach: Cliff Ellis

Sun Belt Conference

Cliff Ellis has won 807 games as a head coach and is the only coach in NCAA history to win at least 170 games with four different Division I programs...in 10 years at Coastal, Ellis has led the Chanticleers to 195 wins...this year marked Coastal's first season as a member of the Sun Belt Conference, posting a 10-8 record... junior Jaylen Shaw leads Coastal in scoring at 14.1 ppg...his 124 assists also rank atop the Chanticleers' stat sheet...for his season, Shaw was named to the Sun Belt Conference's third-team...senior Elijah Wilson is scoring at a 13.2 ppg clip and recently netted his 1,800th career point, placing him third all-time at Coastal.



Eastern Washington University

Head Coach: Jim Hayford

Big Sky Conference

Jim Hayford is in his sixth season at Eastern Washington and has led the Eagles to 106 wins, including this year's 22-11 mark, good for second in the Big Sky Conference...in 34 years at the Division I level, Eastern has won at least 20 games three times, two of which have come under Hayford (2014-15, 2016-17), who is the fastest coach in school history to reach 100 wins...senior Jacob Wiley was named the Big Sky's MVP and was a unanimous first-team all-league selection...he leads the league in rebounding (9.2 rpg), field goal percentage (.643), and blocks (93) and is averaging 20.2 ppg...junior Bogdan Bliznyuk picked up second-team honors for leading the league with a 20.4 ppg average...Eastern advanced to the quarterfinals of the 2016 CBI.



George Mason Patriots

Head Coach: Dave Paulsen

Atlantic 10 Conference

In two years, head coach Dave Paulsen has turned around the Patriots' program...after an initial 11-win season, Paulsen guided George Mason to a 20-13 mark with a roster that features just two seniors...the +9 wins this year rank among the top 15 best turnarounds in the country...by advancing to the quarterfinals of this year's A-10 Tournament, it marked the first time in Mason's four-year tenure in the league that it had won a tournament game...the 20-wins mark the 13th time Mason has won that many games and the first time since 2012-13...Mason's nine A-10 wins this season are a program record...senior Marquise Moore leads the Patriots in scoring (17.4 ppg), rebounding (10.9 rpg), and assists (3.5 apg)...sophomore Otis Livingston is second to Moore in scoring at 10.2 ppg...George Mason advanced to the Finals of the 2013 CBI, losing the third game of the best-of-three series to Santa Clara.



George Washington Colonials

Head Coach: Maurice Joseph

Atlantic 10 Conference

Maurice Joseph took over as the Colonials' head coach just prior to the start of the season and led GW to a 19-14 record and a sixth-place finish in the Atlantic 10... GW enters the CBI having won six of its last seven games...graduate student Tyler Cavanaugh earned second-team All-Conference honors after leading the Colonials in scoring (17.8 ppg) and rebounding (8.4 rpg)...he also had 70 assists and 13 blocked shots and earned additional honors by being named to the All-Academic team... junior Yuta Watanabe scored 12.1 ppg and recorded team highs of 29 steals and 30 blocks in being named to the A-10's All-Defensive team...GW previously played in the 2010 CBI.



Georgia Southern Eagles

Head Coach: Mark Byington

Sun Belt Conference

Now in his fourth season at Georgia Southern, Mark Byington has led the Eagles to two top three finishes in the Sun Belt Conference over the last three seasons, including this year's 11-7 mark along with an 18-14 overall record...sophomores Ike Smith and Tookie Brown garnered first-team All-Sun Belt honors...the duo are the top two leading scorers in the Sun Belt Conference with Smith netting 19.9 ppg and Brown scoring at a 17.4 ppg clip... Brown is also the first sophomore to ever reach 1,000 career points at Georgia Southern...Smith's 5.2 rpg average paces the Eagles.



Green Bay Phoenix

Head Coach: Linc Darner

Horizon League

Linc Darner is in his second season at Green Bay and has led the Phoenix to 41 wins, including this season's 18-13 mark...for the first time in school history, Green Bay placed four players on the All-Horizon League team, led by senior second-team selection Charles Cooper and senior Sixth Man of the Year Warren Jones...Cooper leads Green Bay with a 13.6 ppg average while Jones nets 10.0 ppg and ranks second on the team with 63 assists...the Phoenix lead the Horizon League with an average of 80.1 ppg, scoring at least 80 points 11 times in league play...Green Bay played in the 2009 and 2010 CBIs, advancing to the 2010 quarterfinals.



Hampton Pirates

Head Coach: Edward Joyner

Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference

Edward Joyner is in his eighth season at Hampton and led the Pirates to back-to-back MEAC championships in 2015 and 2016... this year, Hampton features a starting lineup consisting of four sophomores and one freshman...in all, there are 11 freshmen and sophomores on the roster...freshman Jermaine Marrow leads the squad in minutes played (30.7), scoring (15.4 ppg), and assists (3.2 apg)...off the bench, graduate student Lawrence Cooks tallies 11.6 ppg...Hampton previously participated in the 2014 CBI.



UIC Flames

Head Coach: Steve McClain

Horizon League

After winning five games a year ago, the Flames have 15 wins in their second year under head coach Steve McClain...UIC is the youngest team in the nation through March 10 with an average of 0.69 years of Division I playing experience on the roster...the Flames are also among the most improved teams in the country with a +10 wins...junior Tai Odiase was named the Horizon League's Defensive Player of the Year, the first player in school history to be so honored...his 97 total blocks and average of 2.94 per game both rank among the top five nationally...he also averages a team-high 11.1 ppg and 7.3 rpg...freshman Tarkus Ferguson earned All-Rookie honors for averaging 10.9 ppg and leading the HL with a 4.6 apg average...redshirt freshman Dominique Matthews also earned All-Freshman Team honors as UIC was the only HL school with more than one representative.

Loyola (Md.) Greyhounds

Head Coach: G.G. Smith
Patriot League

In his fourth season at Loyola, head coach G.G. Smith led the Greyhounds to 15 wins – the most wins during his tenure at the Baltimore-based school...the 15 wins also mark a six-game improvement from last season, which ranks among the top 40 nationally...part of the reason for the success is defense as Loyola was 261st in country in scoring defense (75.3 ppg), and even worse in opponent 3-point field-goal percentage (307th, .372)...this year, opponents are averaging 68.4 ppg and shooting just .334 from 3-point range...junior Andre Walker leads the Hounds in scoring (15.2 ppg) and assists (3.9 apg) while senior Jarred Jones is right behind with a 15.0 ppg average.



UMKC Kangaroos

Head Coach: Kareem Richardson
Western Athletic Conference

Fourth-year head coach Kareem Richardson already ranks fourth all-time at UMKC in wins (53)...this year's team posted 17 wins – the most during his tenure – and most for the program since 2001-02...Richardson led the Roos to a 5-game winning streak, the longest for the program in 12 years...senior LaVell Boyd was named to the Western Athletic Conference's first-team for leading the Kangaroos with an 17.9 ppg average to go along with a .399 3-point shooting percentage...as a team, UMKC ranks among the top 50 nationally in 3-pointers per game (8.9), total 3-pointers made (295), and 3-pointers taken (797)...senior Darnell Tillman leads the Roos with a 5.5 rpg average...senior Kyle Steward is second in scoring and rebounding with 11.4 ppg and 5.3 rpg.



Rice Owls

Head Coach: Mike Rhoades
Conference USA

At 22-11, the Owls have won more games since 2003-04, when they also won 22...in head coach Mike Rhoades' first two seasons Rice posted 12 wins in each season...sophomore Marcus Evans and junior Egor Koulechov are the first set of Rice teammates to be named first-team All-Conference since 1954...Evans leads the Owls with a 19.1 ppg average as well as with 126 assists and 35 steals...Koulechov averages 18.2 ppg and a team-high 8.9 rpg...the duo are one of only seven sets of teammates nationally to average at least 18 ppg...the Owls average 81.5 ppg, which ranks second in Conference USA...their 21 games of at least 80 points scored is a school record.



San Francisco Dons

Head Coach: Kyle Smith
West Coast Conference

First-year head coach Kyle Smith led the Dons to 20 wins, marking USF's first 20-win season since 2013-14 and third since 1985-86...the Dons have held 12 of their last 14 opponents to under 70 points and allow an average of just 66.8 ppg on the year after yielding 78.7 ppg a year ago...three players were honored by the West Coast Conference – senior Ronnie Boyce garnered second-team laurels for leading the Dons with a 13.1 ppg average...Charles Minlend and Jordan Ratinho were named to the All-Freshman team...Minlend averages 10.0 ppg while Ratinho comes in at 8.4 ppg...USF previously played in the 2012 CBI.



Stony Brook Seawolves

Head Coach: Jeff Boals
America East Conference

In his first year at Stony Brook, head coach Jeff Boals led the Seawolves to an 18-13 record and a second place finish in the America East Conference...the Seawolves accomplished this after losing nearly 80 percent of their offense and 85 percent of their rebounding from a year ago, as well as three-time AEC Player of the Year Jameel Warney...five Seawolves earned AEC post-season awards, led by senior Lucas Woodhouse and his first-team accolades...Woodhouse has a team-best 15.1 ppg average and a league-best 5.1 apg average...his 158 assists on the year are tied for the best in a season in school history...junior Roland Nyama's 25 steals and 18 blocks earned him AEC All-Defensive team honors...Stony Brook previously played in the 2014 and 2015 CBIs.



Toledo Rockets

Head Coach: Tod Kowalczyk
Mid-American Conference

Tod Kowalczyk is in his seventh season at Toledo and has led the Rockets to five straight seasons of at least 17 wins...senior Steve Taylor Jr. earned second-team All-MAC honors for averaging 15.2 ppg to go along with team-highs of 12.4 rpg and 3.8 apg...senior Jonathan Williams, who leads the Rockets with a 19.6 ppg average, received third-team All-MAC accolades for a second-straight year, marking the fifth straight season UT has had at least two members of the all-league squad...Toledo is making its first CBI appearance but Kowalczyk guided Green Bay to the CBI in 2009 and 2010, advancing to the quarterfinals in 2010.



Utah Valley Wolverines

Head Coach: Mark Pope
Western Athletic Conference

Now in his second season at UVU, Mark Pope has led the Wolverines to two more wins than he did a year ago...he also guided UVU to the semifinals of the WAC Tournament with a starting lineup that consists of just one senior...leading the Wolverines in scoring is sophomore Conner Toolson, who is netting 11.8 ppg...junior forward Isaac Neilson was named to the WAC's All-Defensive team for averaging 9.0 rpg and 1.72 bpg...he also ranks second in the WAC with a 56.8 percent clip from the field...Utah Valley is the 10th fastest team in the nation according to KenPom.com at 73.8 possessions per 40 minutes.



Wyoming Cowboys

Head Coach: Allen Edwards
Mountain West Conference

First-year head coach Allen Edwards guided the Cowboys to an 18-14 record with a roster that features only one senior in the rotation...Mountain West Conference Sixth Man of the Year sophomore Justin James leads Wyoming with a 15.7 ppg average, which ranks seventh in the MWC...he has also scored 20 or more points in 10 of the Cowboys' games this season...his .464 field goal percentage is good for sixth in the conference...junior Hayden Dalton nets 12.5 ppg and a team-high 8.4 rpg, fifth in the MWC...he has 11 double-doubles on the season...the Cowboys are making their fifth CBI appearance, the last coming in 2014.
